WEEKLY SERMON

A Good Soldier of Jesus Christ

Warfare has played a mighty part in human history. The race has marched down the centuries to the beat of the drum, the clash of the sabers, the roll of musketry and the tom of plumes. Such is the glory of mankind. The glory of the warrior has been sung from the time when King David led forth the victorious legions of Israel, down through the days of Alexander, Caesar, Napoleon, Washington, Wellington and Lee. A few years ago the world looked with bated breath and sympathetic eye upon the achievements of little Japan pitted against the mighty Russian Bear, and struggling for liberty and the right to grow, expand and wash dishes. That war meant much to the kingdom of our Lord. The deepest interest as well as the enlightened conscience of mankind has cheered the glorious victory of Japan and the dishwashers.

Just now the attention of the world is directed to another war which has grown out of the difference between enlightened conscience and soul liberty which Jesus taught and the dark superstitious conscience which kept the soul in perpetual bondage taught by the Mohammedans. And yet humanity is all most weary of war. The bloodthirsty of the race seemed nearly satisfied. Already we can see the coming of the time when "the common sense of most will hold a fretful realm in awe, and kindly earth shall slumber looked in a universal law." Brute force is passing away, a true ideal is winning its way into the hearts of man. "Peace on earth, good will to man" is now a promise of no distant future.

With the establishment of inter-

national peace conference in 1899 and the arbitration idea so largely predominate today, the time seems to be near at hand that the prophets of old foretold: "Neither shall they learn war any more."

Yet there is a warfare that shall continue to the end. Though conflicts upon tented fields and embattled knights shall cease, there will still go on the struggle of the human heart, for the mastery of its worst self. Added to the united efforts of the choicest spirits of our race for the redemption of the world from the black battalions of unrighteousness and death. The Christian warfare shall continue until Christ shall be crowned King of Universe; not by force of arms on bloody battlefields, but by the scepter of Divine grace and love. In this text the warriors of the cross are called upon to be good soldiers of Jesus Christ. The success of the campaign depends upon the quality of the soldier.

The man behind the gun means much for Christ's conquest. The soldier is called out from his walk in life. He gives himself to his duties. The Christian soldier is called out from the world to do service for "King Emmanuel." He is not called to "sowery beds of ease," but to actual service. One reason why the Christian line is so often weak is that the soldiers are trying to lead double lives. They are trying to fight for Christ with one hand and to hug the world's pleasure to his bosom with the other. It can't be done. If we try to compromise we will be lover of pleasure rather than lovers of God (II Timothy, 3-4) have no fellowship with the "unfaithful workers of darkness." "My people shall be a separate people," saith the Lord.
