building since 1906 has very little timber on it. Bishop settled on it under the provisions of the act June 11, 1906, which made it possible for a homesteader to live on agricultural lands in forest reserves.

Bishop has been farming on the tract, and he recently erected a splendid bungalow there. He maintains that he is farming the land, and is entitled to a patent, while the contention of the forestry service seems to be that Bishop is encroaching on the reserve, and has no right to the land.

Last summer Congressman Hawley came to Klamath Falls for the express purpose of looking into the matter, and he spent several days at the Bishop home, investigating both sides of the matter. His report to the department of agriculture comes as a result of his visit.

Friends of Bishop are of the opinion that the recommendation of Hawley in the Bishop case will result in the issuance of a patent to the local man.
