Forestry Men Will Talk Fire Prevention

Interstate Meeting to be Held in the
West Convenes at Medford Next
Month. Erickson Responsible

The first interstate forest ranger's
convention held in the West will
meet at Medford, February 15 to 21,
and in addition to the officials and
rangers of the Crater national forest,
there will be large delegations of at-
tachés from the Shasta national for-
est, headquarters at Sisson; Klamath
National forest, headquarters at
Yreka, and Siskiyou national forest,
headquarters at Grants Pass.

The arrangements for the conven-
tion are in charge of Supervisor M. L.
Erickson of the Crater national for-
est. He is at work preparing a pro-
gram that will cover every question
with which the forestry service men
have to contend with.

"The question of forest fires will
be one of the main topics," said Mr.
Erickson at the White Palace hotel

Sunday, "and speeches by men of
experience will tend greatly to assist
in eliminating as far as possible the
causes of forest fires, as well as bring
out the best methods of fighting and
controlling the fire, once they start."

Since the disastrous fires of 1912,
which devastated large stretches of
timber in all parts of the Northwest
and caused great loss of life and
property, the forestry service has
made great strides in the work of pre-
venting fires. This is especially true
in the Crater national forest, and ev-
ery summer men under the direction
of Mr. Erickson have been building
miles of trails and stringing tele-
phone lines to all parts of the forest,
which greatly expedites the work of
battling the flames and results in the
extinguishing of chance fires before
the flames gain headway.

FINISHES SURVEY OF COON POINT

WORK OF CORRECTING ERROR
MADE IN 1885 IS ACCOMPLISH-
ED IN FOUR FEET OF SNOW
WITH MERCURY 10 BELOW

Ernest P. Rands, assistant super-
intendent of surveys in the govern-
ment service, returned Saturday eve-
ning from Coon Point on the Upper
Lake, after making a survey of that
neck of land. He left this morning
for Portland.

"During the greater part of the
two weeks we worked at Coon Point,
the thermometer was 10 below zero,
and the ground was covered with four
feet of snow," said Mr. Rands at the
Hotel Hall Sunday. "Despite this,
my assistant, Jerry Darrell, and I
worked every day."

Coon Point extends into Upper
Klamath Lake near Odessa, and in-
stead of following the meander line,
the government survey party in 1885
ran their line across a ridge which
is at an elevation of 200 feet above
the lake. This left from 300 to 400
acres of unsurveyed land between the
surveyors' line and the water.

Mrs. Rose M. Torrey and N. K.
Gray settled on the unsurveyed tract
and the survey was made at their in-
stance, in order to entitle them to
homestead the land.

Before making the survey at Coon
Point, Rands surveyed Buck Island
in Upper Klamath Lake, which is be-
ing homesteaded by P. K. Hamilton.
Rands spent Christmas and New Year
on this island.

Parcel Post Aviator
Delivered Baked
Beans in Biplane

Harrison Martin Jones, a Provi-
dence aviator, made the first parcel
post delivery in an airplane recent-
ly. Jones carried twenty-five pack-
ages, consisting mostly of baked
beans, from Boston to Providence, at
a mile a minute clip. He will de-
liver similar parcels in New London,
New Haven, Hartford, Bridgeport and
New York. Jones is authorized to
act as parcel post carrier by the Unit-
ed States postoffice department.

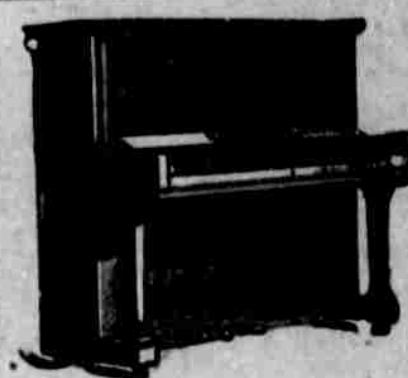
