ES TO PAY FINE IMPOSED BY
LONDON COURT—USES FAMOUS
AMERICANISM**

LONDON, Jan. 22.—"Not one cent
for tribute," dramatically exclaimed
Mrs. Despard, a suffragette, when
fined the equivalent of \$10 for rioting
by the Bow Street court. Her re-
fusal resulted in the changing of the
sentence to fourteen days' imprison-
ment.

Disturbances are reported every
day by the police, and clashes between
the suffragettes and police are be-
coming frequent. A reign of terror
is feared by many residents.

were arrested by the police.
