MANY COUNTRIES PLAN BUILDINGS

YEAR-ROUND EXPOSITION AT SAN
DIEGO WILL BE INTERNATIONAL
IN SCOPE—SOUTH AMER-
ICA ACTIVE

Special to The Herald
SAN DIEGO, Jan. 22.—That the
Panama-California exposition at San
Diego in 1915 is to be international
in scope is made apparent by an-
nouncements that San Domingo, San
Salvador, Guatemala, Porto Rico, the
Republic of Panama, Brazil, Japan
and the Philippines have determined
to place exhibits. Tentative assur-
ances of participation have come from
Hawaii, Costa Rica, Jamaica and Hay-
ti, with strong possibilities that Spain,
the mother country, will also provide
an exhibit. The nations of Central
and South America have been quick
to see the peculiar advertising advan-
tages of an exposition like that at
San Diego, the results in increased
commerce and immigration induced
by the San Diego celebration being
easily foreseen.

Similar interest has grown by
bounds in the states west of the
Rocky Mountains during the last
month. In the legislatures of nearly
every state of the great West meas-
ures appropriating funds for state
exhibits have been introduced,
with powerful public sentiment be-
hind them, and every indication of
their passage. The fact that the San
Diego exposition affords unprece-
dented opportunity for state exploita-
tion by its new plan of display has had
great weight wherever it became
known. Probably the most potent
factor has been the distribution of ex-
hibits according to territory, rather
than by classification, making that of
each state entirely separate from
every other, the entire display being
grouped at one place instead of scat-
tered through a score of mammoth
buildings.

NOTED AUTHOR-TRAVELER-LEC-
TURER ARRIVED LAST EVEN-

At the negotiations of the Balkan
States with Turkey, the question of
the ownership of Adrianople has been
receiving much attention, and it is in-
teresting to note that at the present
time Germany owns the key to the
city, and has it carefully tucked away
in the Berlin arsenal. This key was a
present from the Czar of Russia to
King Frederick Wilhelm III. of Prus-
sia, after the conquest of Adrianople
in 1829, and was given as a token of
appreciation for the excellent work of
the Prussian officers and men in the
campaign.
