BELL TELEPHONE COMPANY NEXT

COMMERCE COMMISSION NOTI-
FIES BIG CONCERN THAT IT
MUST ANSWER CHARGES OF
BEING A MONOPOLY

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 29.—
The American Telephone and Tele-
graph company was today formally
notified by the interstate commerce
commission that it must answer the
complaints made against it by the in-
dependent telephone companies.

The charges made against the Bell
system are that it is a trust, and is
seeking to monopolize the telephone
and telegraph business of the coun-
try, crowding out the smaller con-
cerns.

The date of the investigation has
not been set by the commission.

TYPHOID FEVER RAVAGES ARMY

SERBIAN TROOPS REPORTED TO
BE IN PITABLE CONDITION ON
ACCOUNT OF BIG EPIDEMIC IN
RANKS

VIENNA, Jan. 29.—Typhoid is ra-
ging in the Serbian army with increas-
ing virulence. According to reports
brought across the river from Bel-
grade to Remlin the disease has reach-
ed the proportions of an epidemic. A
special commission of 50 doctors,
nurses and hospital stewards have
been brought from Italy to assist in
the work of checking the disease.

Formation of a County Dairy As-

BIG INCREASE REPORTED IN THE
NUMBER OF DOGS AND HORSES
CONSUMED AS FODSTUFFS IN
GERMANY

BERLIN, Jan. 29.—Owing to the
high cost of living Germany broke all
records last year in the eating of
dogs and horses. According to sta-
tistics there were 7,273 dogs slaugh-
tered in 1912 as against 6,220 the
year previous, and 175,000 horses as
against 145,000 in 1911. While
Prussia consumed more houndstubs,
being at the head of the list of Ger-
man states with 125,000, Bavaria ate
more dogs, 4,223 being butchered in
the kingdom.
