LOS ANGELES, Jan. 30.—"There is
 something vulgar and ostentation-
 ously pagan-like in citizens of this nation
 of ours sitting around a banquet table
 while pictures, showing the pitiable
 conditions in the homes of the poor
 are being shown. In the name of

Christ and the hungry millions, I pro-
 test against such procedure."

The above message was sent to the
 banquet committee of the Board of
 Associated Charities by J. Stitt Wil-
 son, the socialist mayor of Berkeley.
 Wilson sent this reply after receiving
 an invitation to attend the banquet,
 for which a \$3-a-plate fee will be
 charged.

banded to the European ambassadors
 today. The Turks propose to give the
 Balkan allies half of Adrianople, re-
 taining the Holy City section, where
 the Moslem shrines are located.

Turkey declines to surrender the
 Aegean Islands. In the note the Mos-
 lem empire proposes that the status
 and government of the islands be left
 to the powers.

It is also suggested that the distri-
 bution of the remainder of European
 Turkey be left to the powers.

"Fight!" Says Danoff

LONDON, Jan. 30.—"Peace negoti-
 ations cannot be resumed until Tur-
 key agrees to cede the whole of Adri-
 anople, as a basis for the bargaining
 that the new frontier of Turkey be a
 line running from the Black Sea to
 Rodosto," declared Baron Danoff to-

day, after the Turkish note had been
 read.

"The present demands of the allies
 will not be renewed after the first
 shot is fired," he continued. "If war
 is resumed the demands will be still
 greater."

Revolutionists Active

LONDON, Jan. 30.—Dispatches re-
 ceived today from Constantinople con-
 firm the reports of revolution among
 Turkish troops at Chatalja.

Many officers and men were killed,
 and so far 200 have been wounded.

LORELLA LOCALS

The ranchmen in this district are
 welcoming the large amount of snow
 which has fallen here during the last
 few days. While such a depth makes
 travel and work very inconvenient

 the men who have horses to sell.

 Mr. Warren of Bonanza and the Rev.
 Mr. Acheson of Merrill.

Mrs. William Fordney, wife of the
 Lorella postmaster, is recovering

 eration which was performed in Bo-
 nanza recently by Dr. Wright of
 Klamath Falls.

The Lorella school, which was to
 have been opened for its second term
 on January 30th, has been postponed
 one week, owing to the inclemency of
 the weather.

DEALERS RACE FOR ANTIQUES

PEASANT OFFERED SEVERAL
 TIMES AS MUCH FOR STATUE
 SHORTLY AFTER HE SOLD IT
 TO GOVERNMENT OFFICIAL

ROME, Jan. 30.—By beating half a
 dozen dealers in antiques in a race
 to Basano, where it had been learned
 that a peasant had dug up a magnifi-
 cent statue of Aphrodite, a government
 official secured the prize for \$5,000.
 When they arrived on the scene the
 dealers told the peasant that any one
 of them would have been glad to pay
 him \$100,000. The statue is said to
 be a noteworthy example of the best
 Graeco-Roman art.

SCHOOLS SHOW BIG INTEREST

DISTRICTS IN SOUTHERN PART

The directors of the Malin and
 Shasta View schools have voted funds
 to defray the expense of a lecture in
 each district, the directors of the Mer-
 rill school are considering the advan-
 tage of having two lectures deliv-
 ered there and the Henley school is
 also considering the plan, according
 to County School Superintendent Fred
 Peterson, who returned Wednesday
 evening from a visit to the districts in
 the vicinity of Merrill.

Peterson and Max A. McCall, in-
 structor in agriculture at the high
 school, will visit Bonanza tomorrow
 night, where Mr. McCall will lecture
 on "New View of Rural Life." The
 program will be supplemented by
 numbers rendered by the school chil-
 dren.

A week later Mr. McCall will lec-
 ture at the Lower Poo Valley school.
