LAFFERTY STILL AFTER RAILWAY

OREGON CONGRESSMAN FOR-
WARDS BILL TO MEMBERS OF
OREGON LEGISLATURE FOR IN-
TRODUCTION AT SESSION

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 31.—
A form of bill for consideration by
the legislative assembly of Oregon
has been forwarded to J. H. Upton,
member of the lower house at Salem,
at his request, by Congressman Lafferty,
for the protection of the public in
litigation to compel the Oregon and
California Railroad company to for-
feit or to sell its grant lands to set-
tlers at \$2.50 per acre. This bill pro-
vides that all taxes paid by the com-
pany on these lands shall be refunded
by the state in case the lands are
finally declared forfeited to the United
States. If the assembly does not
adopt the measure it may be taken up
on initiative petition.

Congressman Lafferty has for sev-
eral years been interested in trying
to compel the railroad to sell its
granted lands at \$2.50, as prescribed
in the government grant. As the com-
pany will urge in court that it has
paid "a large sum"—15 cents per
acre up to the date of filing of the
present suit—in taxes, the state law
proposed by Lafferty would remove
that defense.

AUSTRIAN WRESTLER FAILS TO THROW BOTHNER



Although Henry Irrlinger holds the
Lord Lonsdale belt, which is as heavy
as a horse collar with gold and silver
ornaments, and is emblematic of the
middleweight wrestling championship
of Europe, he failed miserably in his
efforts to grind George Bothner, the
peerless American, into the canvas.
Irrlinger, by the terms of the match,
which was held in New York recently,
was to throw Bothner three times
within an hour. Instead of carrying
this fifty to a finish, he came near
losing all of his laurels to Bothner,
who had the Austrian's shoulders to
the mat four times. In the last five
minutes of the match Bothner open-
ed up a big box of tricks, and when
the final gong rang Irrlinger was very
glad that school had let out, and it
was time to go home.

Irrlinger has enjoyed a rapid rise to
the topmost position in his class
abroad. He is 24 years old, is 5 feet
8 inches in height, and weighs 161
pounds, although when necessary he
can do the middleweight limit. He
began wrestling six years ago as an
amateur and disposed of all the cham-
pions in his home country, France,
and Germany. He won the big inter-
national amateur title in London in
1906, and a year later entered the
professional ranks. As a pro, he had
never been near defeat until he met
Bothner. The wonderful American
grappler is well past the age when
champions slip into the discard, and
has practically retired from wrestling,
but came out of his shell long enough
to show the breezy Austrian that
wrestling is not all beer and skittles.

THIRD REPORT WILL BE FILED
BY FEBRUARY 26, AND ON
THAT DAY TWENTY-FIVE MIL-
LION WILL BE DIVIDED

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 31.—Final
distribution of the immense "Lucky
Baldwin" estate will be effected Feb-
ruary 26th, according to a schedule
that is partially fulfilled by the filing
of a second supplementary report by
the attorney for the executor. The
necessary third report will be filed on
that date. According to the status of
the estate, the heirs, Mrs. Clara Bal-
dwin Stocker and Mrs. Anita Baldwin
McCloughry will divide approxima-
tely \$25,000,000. To date the heirs
have received in cash \$2,159,376.22.

For several months a band of high-
ly efficient auto bandits has been en-
gaged in the profitable business of
collecting rare coins, jewelry and
treasure certificates from the citizens
of Chicago. Each bandit was ob-

tieth century buccanniers came and

General Rafael Reyes
General Rafael Reyes, former pres-
ident of the Republic of Colombia, and
his daughter are now in New York,
where they are working to help the
cause of mutual friendship and under-
standing between the countries of
North and South America. At a lun-
cheon given recently in his honor by the
Pan-American state association, Gen-
eral Reyes said that he cordially of-
fered the future relations of the United
States with the entire South Amer-
ican continent depends on the just
settlement of the differences existing
between this country and Colombia.
He believes that the misunderstanding
in regard to the Panama canal
question should be settled before the
big ditch is declared open for traffic.
He further stated that the greatest
accomplishment of the United States
was not the building of the canal, but
the work of sanitation which has op-
ened Central America to colonization.
It is General Reyes' belief that Col-
ombia is still bitter toward the
United States, but he states that his
country is willing to leave the differ-
ences to a court of arbitration. It was
only a few years ago that the general
wanted to fight the United States for
backing Panama in her rebellion
against Colombia.

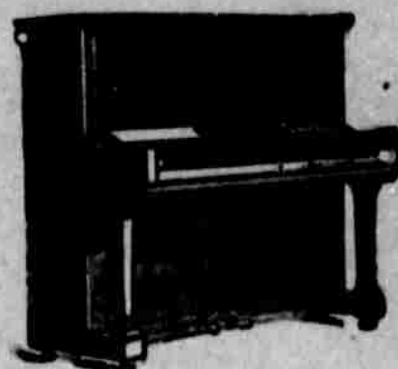
