succeeded in getting himself dis-
fitted by his brother, Czar Nicholas, and has
been relieved of his duties as com-
mander of the Chevalier Guards.
Nicholas was greatly displeased when
Michael married Mrs. Shermettev-
skala, and his irritation has found
expression in several official acts
which will deprive the offending
brother of many of his comforts.
An imperial ukase has been issued es-
tablishing a guardianship over the
grand duke's person, property and af-
fairs, under the direction of the czar,
while administration of Michael's es-
tate has been transferred to the de-
partment of appanages of the minis-
try of the imperial court. All of
which should be enough to cause
Michael some worry, but in order to
make it clear that Nicholas has some-
thing on his mind, Michael has been
supplied with several yards of mileage
tickets, good on any road out of St.
Petersburg, and has been given the
tip that the climate in Southern Eu-
rope is wonderfully beneficial to one

the czar of all the Russias.
