

DIG PROGRESS MADE AT EXPO.

WORK ON IMPROVING GROUNDS
GOES ALONG AT RAPID RATE.
MANY CONTRACTS ARE NOW
WELL UNDER WAY

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 31.—The buildings and grounds committee of the Panama-Pacific International exposition, in a report just submitted to the board of directors, stated that work in that department is progressing with great rapidity.

The contract for filling Presidio lands will be completed within the next ten days. The construction of the service building will be completed in a day or so.

The construction of a roadway through Fort Mason is completed with the exception of the surfacing of the asphalt surface, which will be laid as soon as the weather permits, it being necessary to have dry weather to successfully lay asphalt.

The construction of the South Garden sewers has been practically completed, as is also the grading of the site of the Machinery building.

Bids for the construction of the high pressure water system were received on January 28th. A contract for the construction of the sanitary and storm sewers in the State and Foreign Pavilion sites has been awarded, and the contract will be signed within the next few days.

The contract for the preparation of gardens and courts in well under way, and will probably be completed within the next ten days.

The construction of Machinery hall contract has been awarded, also, the contract price being \$451,900.

Bids have been received for the construction of the service water supply system, for the construction of the ferry slips and for the construction of a hydraulic power plant.

Plans and specifications for the Machinery building are prepared and an estimate of the cost is being made. Contracts for the lumber for the Machinery building, aggregating \$550,000, have been let at a cost of \$118,000. Bids for the construction of steel girders and for ferry slips have been received.

GEORGE MCCABE WILL PRACTICE
LAW IN PORTLAND, ACCORDING
TO SECRETARY WILSON'S AN-
NOUNCEMENT

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 31.—The resignation of George McCabe as solicitor general of that branch of the government, was announced today by Secretary Wilson of the department of agriculture. The resignation becomes effective March 4.

McCabe was the bitter foe of Dr. Harvey Wiley, formerly chief of the bureau of chemistry of the department, and foremost in the fight against adulterated foodstuffs. It is McCabe's intention to practice law in Portland.

Four Hundred Women Appeal for Suffrage

Presentation of Claim to Congressional
Committee on Elections is
Made by Prominent Women

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 31.—Led by Mrs. Clara Colby of Portland, Ore., four hundred workers for the woman's suffrage cause made a logical demonstration in favor of their cause before the house committee on elections this afternoon.

The demonstration is a part of their effort for the passage of a bill permitting women to vote at congressional elections.

Mrs. Colby opened the hearing in

an impassioned address in which she urged the enactment of a constitutional amendment prohibiting states from disenfranchising citizens because of sex. Other noted women followed her.

The claim of the women was supported by two Western members of the house, LaFollette of Oregon and Baker of California, and a dozen other members of the house. All cited the success of equal suffrage in their home states.

Works Six Year Term Bill Creates a Stir

In Addition to the Debate in Con-
gress, Argument Over Measure
in Legislature Ends in Row

SACRAMENTO, Jan. 31.—During a bitter debate over Sanford's resolution approving the Works presidential election bill in the assembly today, Caminetti refused to take his seat when ordered to do so. He was arrested and escorted to his seat.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 31.—The debate of the Work's bill for a

six-year presidential term was resumed today. Strong opposition to the measure by the progressives, who believe the bill is designed to make Roosevelt ineligible for election. Senators Bristow and Poinsett are leading the opposition.

The Owen amendment for the direct election of the president was defeated, 31 to 52. It also provided for a six-year term of office.
