PELICANS HAVE TOUGH HIDE

WASHINGTON, D. C. Feb. 1.—Congressman Henry Fortson of California has received a petition, signed by Mrs. Julia P. Churchill and 250 citizens of Yreka and Colusa, in Butte County, asking the government to acquire a grove of Redwood timber (sequoia sempervirens) in Humboldt county, for the purpose of a national redwood park.

Congressman Fortson is working through Senator Stanford to acquire the timber from all over Northern California.

The giant sequoia are gradually disappearing, and to the end that their memory shall not be forgotten, Congressman Fortson has introduced a joint resolution, asking the establishment of a commission by the president of the senate and speaker of the house to investigate and report upon the same. The resolution is before the committee on agriculture.
