Bill No. 244 of the last legislature, to build Spring Creek hatchery. This bill will tie the commission's hands if the site cannot be obtained.

Ramsby immediately made a canvass of the business district, and secured a large number of signatures to the following telegram, to be sent to Representative Smith:

"The establishment of a trout hatchery in Klamath county should be left in the hands of the fish and game commission. Senate Bill No. 244 is unnecessary, as the commission will act as soon as the land is secured. This bill should not be passed, as it prevents the commission from building a hatchery in Klamath county in case the Spring Creek site cannot be secured."

In addition to signing the telegram many business men have written letters and sent telegrams to other members of the house.

The bill for the Spring Creek hatchery was introduced at the 1911 session of the legislature by Senator Geo. H. Merryman, but it was voted by the governor on account of the creation of the state fish and game commission, whose duty it is to attend to such matters. The Spring Creek site is located on the Klamath Indian reservation, and the purchase of the site may never be possible. The passage of the bill would have the Klamath county hatchery located on that stream, while the fish and game commission is considering other local streams for a central hatchery in case the Spring Creek tract cannot be secured.

Mr. Smith has written to The Herald that there is no necessity in passing the measure, and it is probable that he has already taken the action requested in the telegram sent him today.
