MODOC WAR DEAD IN NEW CEMETERY

GOVERNMENT GRANTS PORTION OF FORT BIDEWELL RESERVATION FOR BURYING PLACE FOR INDIANS AND SOLDIERS

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 5.—The senate has approved the house granting 10 1/2 acres of the old Fort Bidwell military reservation, including the cemetery where lie buried the victims of the Modoc Indian war, to the Fort Bidwell People's Church Association, to be used as a cemetery, and to be held in trust for the town of Fort Bidwell, the Masonic and Odd Fellows' lodges and for the interment of soldiers and Indians. The reservation is now used for an Indian school.

DANISH UNIONS ARE STRONGEST

BERLIN, Feb. 5.—Denmark is industrially the best organized country in the world, according to statistics compiled by the general committee of the German trade unions, its percentage of the number of organized workmen to the entire number of employees being 51.75. Next comes Germany with 32.91, Norway with 27.64, Sweden with 21.68, and the United States as fifth on the list with 19.26. The aggregate number of trade union members shows Germany in the lead, with 2,661,902. England is second, with 2,010,346, and the United States third, with 2,262,361.

WORK IS FOR THE INTEREST OF ALL

GOVERNMENT ENGINEERS, IN WITHDRAWING AND CLASSIFYING LANDS, STRIVE TO DO THE MOST GOOD

WASHINGTON, Feb. 5.—The public land problem of today, as viewed from the standpoint of a federal officer or from that of a private engineer, is one of administration and of legislation.

Not only is the engineer interested in the right classification of land in order that it may not be an accessory to an engineering project that involves large economic waste. His professional code opposes contributing his technical skill to a mining development or an irrigation scheme or a hydro-electric installation whose only possible purpose is the taking of a promoter's profits before that day of reckoning when the balance is struck between cost and value. Therefore, we are all alike interested in knowing the facts of land classification that will prevent the construction of reservoirs and canals for a Carey act project, for example, where the water supply is insufficient or the soil unsuited to irrigation. We will agree that power sites should be used as such and not as homesteads; that mineral lands should be acquired by mining men for mine development, and not by non-resident capitalists for the timber value; that irrigable lands should be irrigated and not dry farmed; and that reservoir sites should be used to promote irrigation or power development and not as cattle ranches.

The withdrawal of power sites by the federal government to the extent of nearly 2,000,000 acres has not been actuated by any desire to arrest the industrial development of the West, but these executive acts have the constructive purpose of insuring the highest use of these most valuable portions of the public domain. The conflict in the use of our public land streams for municipal purposes, irrigation, and power, is fully recognized, and one of the survey engineers has recently published in a technical journal a discussion of these temporary use of a particular stream, but its highest ultimate utilization must be considered. The use for irrigation will be given the preference in one case, the power development in another, while in a third the stream may be harnessed so as to serve effectively both uses.

RAILROAD RUMORS FROM LAKEVIEW

JIM HILL IS EXPECTED TO BUILD INTO LAKE COUNTY SOON—WESTERN PACIFIC RUMORS ARE CURRENT

More railroad talk that is worthy of reading is in the following interview which appears in the Lassen Advocate says the Lakeview Examiner.

In conversation with L. E. Knoch, who came up from the city Monday, it is learned that agents and higher officials of the Western Pacific as well as are completely disgusted with conditions along the line of that road. Mr. Knoch had some talk with one who is in a position to know, and from him received information that Hill is coming down through this section soon. The logical conclusion is that the Western Pacific, disgusted and crippled by its expensive "scenic route" through Plumas county, will meet the northern road somewhere in Harney Lake Valley. Hill may be depended on to find a way when he gets ready to build, and from certain indications the chances seem to favor entrance into Honey Lake Valley, down the Plute Creek. The Western Pacific cut-off will give him as direct a route to San Francisco from the point of connection as he could find anywhere, and permit him to get to San Francisco much quicker than he could by going to Doyle over the narrow gauge lines to a connection at that point.

YUBA CITY YOUTH CATCHES ROBBERS

FINDING POSTOFFICE BANDITS ASLEEP, LAD TELEPHONES TO SHERIFF AND HOLDS ROBBERS WITH A GUN

YUBA CITY, Cal., Feb. 5.—Captured through the daring of 14-year-old Walter Cress, son of a farmer near Live Oak, Sutter county, two men who blew the safe in the Live Oak postoffice and eluded a posse, are in the county jail here, awaiting the arrival of Deputy United States Marshal Frank Kiernan from San Francisco. The bandits were found with their loot in a corral with the Cress boy standing guard over them with a gun. Young Cress was alone on the farm at the time, and he came upon the exhausted robbers sleeping in the corral. He telephoned to the sheriff and then returned with a gun, when the bandits awoke the boy forced them to keep their position on the ground until the posse arrived.

Pulse of a Horse

"The normal pulse of a horse may vary from 28 to 40 pulsations a minute," says a veterinary science lecture report being prepared for the short course at the Oregon Agricultural College.

"The best place to take the pulse of the horse is at the point where the sub-maxillary or facial artery in company with the vein of the same name and Stenson's duct, turn around the edge of the inferior maxilla or lower jaw bone, in other words on the jaw bone about four inches in front in front of the throat latch."
