Don't Want Trio in the Movies

OAKLAND LABORERS THREATEN TO BOYCOTT PICTURE THEATERS SHOWING FILM OF CONVICTED MEN IN LEAVENWORTH

OAKLAND, Feb. 7.—Taking the stand that so long as their appeal is unsettled, the thirty-three union men sentenced to various terms of imprisonment for unlawfully transporting dynamite, have not been legally convicted. A. A. Lloyd, business agent of the Building Trades Council of Alameda county has threatened a boycott of all moving picture theaters from showing pictures of O. A. Tveitmo and E. A. Clacey, both San Franciscans, in custody. He is backed up by the trades unions.

NEW LEADERS OF THE YOUNG TURKS PARTY

TALAT BEY, ENVER BEY.

Talat Bey, who, with Enver Bey, killed Nazim Pasha, general in chief of the Turkish army, has been appointed minister of the interior by the Young Turks. Enver Bey has taken the place of the man he killed, and with the other Young Turks, has established a military tribunal, with Enver Bey as provisional president. Wholesale arrests have been made by the new leaders, and the jails in Istanbul are filled with industrial men suspected of fomenting a counter-revolutionary plot. The ambassadors of the powers have refused to recognize the revolutionary government, and have declined to discuss affairs in the Balkans with Enver Bey. It is said that not more than 50 per cent of the Turkish army are in favor of the new government, and thousands of troops are marching back to Constantinople from Ghazini to avenge the death of Nazim Pasha.

CHURCHMEN, THEATER MANAGERS AND THE PACIFIC COAST LEAGUE MAGNATES UNITE IN LOBBYING AGAINST IT

SALEM, Feb. 7.—Early in the arena of legislation to fight against the passage of the bill introduced in the house Monday by Representative Nolte making Sunday a legal day of rest are Professor C. S. Longacre of Washington, D. C., international field secretary of the Religious Liberty Bureau, and Elder W. F. Martin, secretary of the Northwest Religious Liberty Association. The bill will be opposed also by representatives of the theater interests of the state and a strong delegation, headed by Attorney John F. Logan of Portland, who will appear before the committee to present arguments as to why such a measure should not be passed.

Nolte introduced the bill by request, and it is said not to find much favor even with him. Such a bill has been introduced regularly for several sessions, and always has been defeated by a substantial majority. Seventh Day Adventists, Seventh Day Baptists and members of other religious bodies observing Saturday as the Sabbath regard such a measure as an "unwarranted encroachment" on their rights of conscience. The theatrical interests oppose it on the ground that it tends to Puritanism, and will deprive people of their right to enjoy Sunday in recreation. They are not prone to enlarge on the fact that it means substantial reductions in box office receipts.

Judge W. W. McCredie and Walter McCredie came up from Portland on Monday night to inquire about the prospects of Nolte's bill passing. They declare that passage means the death of baseball in Oregon, and that the Beavers might as well look for jobs elsewhere.
