Henry P. Davidson

Henry Pomeroy Davidson, who ap-
peared before the Pajo committee
with a statement prepared by J. P.
Morgan, and who told the investi-
gators that there was no money trust,
is managing partner of Morgan & Co.
He is probably the most important
young man in Wall street, and has
lifted himself into his position by his
own boot straps. He started his ca-
reer as a school teacher, but the at-
mosphere was not to his liking, so he
came to New York and got a job in a
bank, where he could hear coins clink
and bills crinkle all day. Morgan
discovered Davidson when New York
financial men were running in short
circles at the time of the 1907 panic.
Davidson made a hit with the great
financier because of his coolness and
knowledge of inside finance. He
joined the Morgan firm in 1908.
