CHIEF SIGNAL OFFICER GOES TO RETIREMENT

GENERAL ALLEN'S CAREER
LIKE A NOVEL

From the Time He Left West Point in 1875 Until the Close of the Spanish-American War Officer Has Seen All Kinds of Active Service—Has Advanced the Efficiency of the Corps.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 2.—

After a life check full of adventure and achievement, honored in the service of his government, Brigadier General James Allen, chief signal officer of the United States army, will on February 15 retire from active service and go back to live the remainder of his life in his boyhood home at La Porte, Indiana.

General Allen has a military record of forty-one years which reads like a novel. Himself of modest bearing, it is in the official, routine, perfunctory records of the war department that the full story of his adventures may be gleaned.

All the way from fighting on the old Indian frontier down to handling the highly scientific questions of development of military aviation and the wireless, General Allen has been in the forefront.

Allen graduated from West Point in 1875, and, in the cavalry branch, immediately saw service in the Indian campaigns in the Middle West. In 1891 he was transferred to the signal corps because of his unusual ability in arranging means for military communication.

It was, however, in the Spanish-American war that the army officer forever established the reputation of the army signal corps. For leading General Allen's first in Santiago harbor and supplying information which resulted in the destruction, Brigadier General Allen received a letter of commendation from President McKinley.

He was ordered by the secretary of war to destroy the Cuban cables. On the cable ship, with a foreign crew, and harassed by Spanish torpedo boats, he completed this perilous task. While working on the last of the cables a Spanish ship opened fire on the Arctar, and Allen's crew revolted. At the point of a pistol, he, assisted by several other officers, forced the crew to work.

Since becoming chief signal officer, Brigadier General Allen has been in charge of military aviation. He was instrumental in inducing congress to make the first appropriation for an army aviation school. He purchased two airplanes, designed five aviators, and selected a site at College Park, Maryland.

FIRST MONUMENT TO THE ARMY AND THE GRAY



This beautiful monument to the men who fought in the war of the rebellion is to be erected in Fayetteville, Ga. It is the first monument of its kind in existence, will cost approximately \$150,000, and will be constructed of granite, bronze and glass. It was designed by H. M. Viquey.

From the base of the winged figure of Peace it will be 135 feet. The four granite steps leading to the entrance typify the four years of the war. There will be four doors, each surmounted by an inscription. The one to the north, reading "Grand Army of the Republic," that above the south door "To the Confederate Veterans," and those to the east and west "To the daughters of the Confederacy" and "The Women's Relief Corps." Inside, facing each other, will be life-size effigies of Jefferson Davis and Abraham Lincoln. The immense bronze figure over the north entrance represent Lee and Grant. On the opposite side of the monument will be statues portraying a northern soldier and a southern soldier supporting a United States flag. On the east side Prosperity will be depicted, while on the west side will be figures to represent Progress and Opportunity. The winged figure of Peace will be sixteen feet high.
