

KLAMATH DISPLAY MASKERS HAVE IN SAN JOSE H.S. A GREAT EVENING

PRODUCES OF THIS SECTION OCCUPY PROMINENT PLACE IN
SCHOOLS "COMMERCIAL MUSEUM"—OLIVER IS INFORMED

Secretary C. T. Oliver of the Klamath Chamber of Commerce has received a letter from the San Jose high school, stating that the Klamath county exhibits occupy a prominent position in the Commercial Museum just opened at that institution.

The museum contains displays of agricultural and industrial activities from all parts of the United States. In addition to exhibits from Mexico and Canada. In itself it is a great educational feature, and all the exhibits were collected by the students of the high school, which makes the collection of more than usual interest.

As soon as the plan was first discussed, the assembly of the school took the matter up of a suitable display with Mr. Oliver, who was then in attendance at a land show, and he forwarded a creditable collection to the school.

In addition to this representation from Klamath county, the students of the San Jose high school have further knowledge of Klamath Falls and vicinity, as Mr. Oliver also sent the schools his most recent collection of colored map-views in this section. This was used to illustrate a lecture on the Klamath country, and it attracted a great deal of interest on the part of the faculty and students of the California school.

YOUNG HARRIMAN IS A DIRECTOR

NEW YORK, Feb. 9.—Reorganization of the United States corporate court's order for a divorce of the Union Pacific and Southern Pacific railroads was made at a meeting here today by the executive committee of both systems. The plan for dissolution was first presented at separate meetings, and then received the unanimous approval of both committees. It was said a statement giving details of the plan will be issued.

At a meeting of the executive committee of the Union Pacific William Averell Harriman, son of the late H. H. Harriman, was admitted into the directorate of the vast system of railroads built up by his father. He was elected a director of the Union Pacific to succeed H. W. Demarest. Frank Trumbull was elected as director to succeed Julius Kretschmitt.
