Reclamation Service Has Just Completed Work of Installing Improved Type at Intakes

M. R. Taylor, an attaché of the local branch of the reclamation service, has just completed the work of installing fish screens at the intakes of the main canal and the Home canal. The old screens are entirely removed. The screens just installed were designed especially for the purpose, and they have the approval of the federal authorities, while the state fish and game commission has announced the type to be the most effective called to their attention. It is now impossible for trout to get into the irrigation canals from the Upper Lake.

After his resignation a mob stoned Katsura in the street and rioters attacked the offices of the newspapers that had betrayed him, and the government buildings.
