New Masonic Building Will Cost at Least \$60,000.00

Structure Will be Modern in Every Detail, and All the Rooms Will be Lighted from the Outside. Perspective Ready Monday in Afternoon

Plans for the new Masonic temple, to be built at the corner of Sixth street and Klamath avenue, are being completed by Voghte & Co., architects.

The first floor will be devoted to store rooms, and the portions of the second floor facing on Klamath avenue and Sixth street will be office suites.

They have decided upon a method of raising the money, which is outlined in the following: Subscription for Stock

The plans call for an expenditure of between \$40,000 and \$50,000. With the property costing \$10,000, the new structure, when completed, will represent an expenditure of nearly \$40,000.

The plan of the building is such that there will be no "inside" rooms. The store rooms will face on Sixth street, and the entrance to the basement and upstairs will be on that side.
