MEXICO CITY, Feb. 15.—President Madero flatly refused the request of the Mexican senate that he resign. Senator De La Barra left the palace and went immediately to the chamber of deputies, where he commenced the preparation of a manifesto, saying that unless Madero resigns immediately American intervention is certain. The manifesto will plead with the senate to take steps to force Madero out. Berger Introduces Resolution in the House Providing for the Operation of Railroads by U. S.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 15.—Congressman Berger today introduced a resolution in the house empowering the government to seize and operate fifty-four Eastern railroads if the impending strikers strike later over a week.

The resolution provides that if the strikers are unable to settle their differences with the railroad companies the postmaster general shall operate the railroads until congress inaugurates a department of railways.

Lecture Course for the Dairymen is Discussed

Many Helpful Ideas are Outlined by President Ezell of County Dairymen's Association at Meet

A lecture course for the benefit of Klamath county dairymen; a number of competitions to stimulate interest in dairying; articles in the local papers each week concerning the movement; appointment of committees to act in behalf of the members of the association in settling differences—these and other progressive measures were outlined at a portion of the year's work of the Klamath County Dairymen's Association by James Ezell, the president. The meeting held at the Chamber of Commerce this afternoon was attended by forty dairymen and several new members joined. Work of getting all the farmers and dairymen in the county as members will be taken up by districts within a short time. U. E. Needer will take up this work in the Keno district, and special committees will be appointed for Merrill, Bonanza, Fort Klamath and Bonanza. Lyle O. Mills and Max A. McCall will act as a committee to work in different parts of the county. The lecture plan discussed is to have dairy experts from the Oregon Agricultural College visit Klamath County and lecture on matters pertaining to the industry at the different dairying centers. These are always followed by helpful discussions.

Mandamus Action is to be Against County Treasurer

Suit Will Be Started to Require the Payment of Warrants in the Order in Which They are Registered. Is the Third Action Filed in Three Days

Late this afternoon the papers in an action entitled M. M. Obenshain vs. Claude H. Daggett, treasurer of Klamath county, were prepared, but it is not probable that they will be filed until Monday.

Late this afternoon a demand was made on County Treasurer Daggett that he pay a general fund warrant with money from the court house fund. The warrant was for \$9.49, and was presented June 2, 1916. The county treasurer refused payment, acting on legal advice.

An action for an alternate writ of mandamus will be started into this afternoon against the county treasurer. The purpose is to compel the payment of warrants in the order in which they are registered.

It is claimed that the law requires that the treasurer shall call warrants in the order in which they are registered, except that funds legally established and set apart may be paid in cash at any time, even though other warrants may be outstanding.

The particular contention of Kaykendall & Ferguson, who are attorneys in the case, is that by the payment of warrants drawn on certain funds tends to establish preferred creditors. This is based on the theory that certain special funds have been illegally established.

The action today is the forerunner of others, which are calculated to take into court all of the problems of law on which attorneys are not agreed.

"Our clients in these cases," said Mr. Ferguson today, "seek only to determine the questions involved. They believe the questions involved should be solved before the summer opens. We will make every effort to expedite these cases, and do not anticipate that any contemplated improvements for this summer will be interfered with."

Fisher Will Make no Change in Crater Lake Superintendent

Local Friends Receive Information to the Effect that Interior Department Refuses to Heed the Petition of Will G. Steel for the Position

That there will be no change in the office of superintendent of Crater Lake National Park as long as Secretary Fisher remains at the head of the department of the interior is the announcement of friends of Superintendent W. Frank Arant of this city, whose position is sought by Will G. Steel, president of the Crater Lake company. It is authoritatively stated by close friends of Mr. Arant that under date of January 25, Mr. Fisher stated positively that he intended to make no change in the superintendency at this time despite the efforts of those pushing against Arant. In the letter written by Fisher, following the filing of a petition for Steel's appointment, the official takes a stand point against the supplanting of Arant by the Portlander.

When it was announced that Steel sought to have Arant retire in his favor, local business men at a mass meeting announced their support of Arant, and received with much enthusiasm his announcement that he would not resign in Steel's favor. A few days later, a petition urging that the secretary of the interior make no change in the superintendency of the park was placed in circulation, and was freely signed.

Federal Court Overrules Finding of Special Board of Inquiry at Ellis Island in Immigration Matter

NEW YORK, Feb. 15.—United States District Judge Wood today set aside the findings of the special board of inquiry at Ellis Island, in which it was held that former President Castro of Venezuela could not remain in the United States.

Judge Wood held that Castro is entitled to remain here as long as he pleases. Castro announced that he would not leave his case by word but would fight the case.

Johnson Writes About Land Grabbing Cases

President of the Klamath Development Co. is Involved, According to Paper, in Work of Fred Lake

S. O. Johnson, president of the Klamath Development company, has become involved in the L. E. Clark government land manipulations, according to the Sacramento Bee. The following is from that paper:

It seems that Johnson's application submitted to the Lake's which was rejected by the Thompson on January 1, 1918, must wait until the case is disposed of before they can get their land.

S. O. Johnson, vice president of the Wood Lumber company, and the man to whom Louis E. Clark, county secretary of the conservation commission, admitted he owed his job as a land agent for several lumber concerns, is shading out letters urging persons who have had an opportunity to look into the case to be closed, by cooperating with Fred W. Lake of Oakland, who has been named by state officials as being one of the best of the public land officers.

Taking advantage of the fact that Johnson was in the habit of paying out money to persons who were all acquainted with Johnson's case, Lake, who is now in the state, will agree to pay Johnson \$25,000 per year.

Lake's application for \$25,000 per year of land in national reservations was turned down by Governor General W. S. Hoar, and Lake immediately began work on the state, and upon his application will stand as a check against Johnson who wish to obtain title to the land.
