PETERSON WANTS PUPILS TO SPELL

COUNTY SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT PLANS TO SEND A LIST TO THE DIFFERENT DISTRICTS FREQUENTLY

To check the tendency toward poor spelling, County School Superintendent Fred Peterson has arranged a definite system for teaching orthography, which will be put into use at once.

He prepares lists of words frequently misspelled, and these are sent to the different schools, there being separate work for different grades. After study is given the words submitted, spelling matches are recommended.

Among the words for seventh grade pupils are the following:
 Tullies, confluent, predilect, storn, league, mullish, stygian, anodous, perable, pumant, perment, protant, water.

The word as outlined at present is for the fourth, fifth, sixth and seventh grades. Not more than four new words will be taken up at any one lesson.

The idea is to give the pupils a clear mental picture of the word, and they will be required to spell them orally and write them. In addition the pupils will learn the proper pronunciation and the definitions of the words.

HIGH SCHOOLS ARE IMPROVED

STUDENTS ENTERING STATE INSTITUTIONS ARE MUCH BETTER PREPARED THAN IN FORMER YEARS

CORVALLIS, Feb. 20.—That the high schools of the state are much improved is shown by the far better preparation of the students entering the state agricultural college. The biennial report of the regents notes a striking improvement during recent years in the preparation of those who come to the college from the high schools of Oregon.

"There has been a corresponding improvement in the work of the students," says the report. "The heads of the departments uniformly report that the students are much better prepared each year for their college work. Statistics compiled by the registrar yield the following summary, which indicates the marked improvement in general scholarship throughout the institution during the past three years: The number of regularly matriculated students whose average was below the passing grade in 1909-10 was 19 per cent; 1910-11, 11 per cent; in 1911-12, 6 per cent.

"This great improvement is largely due to the improved facilities for the work, provided by the construction of new buildings, purchase of additional equipment, the more complete organization of the departments, and the employment of additional instructors. But the superior work of the high schools in which students receive their preparation for admission to the college undoubtedly has been an important factor."

CHINESE HINK COMING AGAIN

The members of the Chinese University of Hawaii baseball team are so well pleased with the treatment they received from their American opponents last year that they have decided to pay another visit to this country. Captain Akana states that the team, which will be composed of about fifteen players, will leave Honolulu on March 19. He expects to arrive in San Francisco on March 26, immediately after which the long list of dates arranged for the oriental athletes will be begun. Starting on the coast the team will work its way eastward, playing games in the Coast and Middle states. After these are finished a number of games will be played with the big Eastern teams. The trip will be concluded on June 31, after which the team will return home. All told, the tour will comprise approximately 50,000 miles.

"There is only place in the houses of parliament where women may go unaccompanied by a member," said Mrs. Snowden, "and that is a cage with a grille in front of it."

The members say that the women have a habit of throwing flowers down on them, hence the grille. The gallery for women visitors accommodates only thirty-two, while the men's gallery holds 200.
