MEXICO CITY, Feb. 21.—Francisco Madero, the deposed president, is a nervous wreck since his arrest. He cowers from sight as much as possible at his quarters in the palace, fearing every moment that he may be killed.

Madero and Vice President Suarez say they learned from their guards that if the cabinet so decides, they will be shot under the fugitive law.

Provisional President Huerta has assured Senora Madero that her husband is in no immediate danger of execution.

Madero's fate will probably remain undecided until tonight, when it is considered by the new congress.

It is reported that there is a treasury deficit of 5,000,000 pesos. Madero must account for this.

Grand Jury Reports

Confined to an answer of two features of the reply of the county court to the original report of condemnation, the Klamath county grand jury at 5:15 this afternoon made a report to the circuit court.

The report of this afternoon is brief, and, at the conclusion, carries a note of harmony.

"Owing to certain political conditions," says the report, "in which we refuse to become involved, we have decided to make no public report of our further investigations at this time.

"We wish to say that we have not a single personal grievance against the county court. There has not been a time since this investigation began when we would not gladly have side-stepped the whole proposition. But in doing so we would have side-stepped a plain duty. Though we can find no proof of criminal intent, we thought the people should know that their money was being spent too freely and carelessly. We have nothing but admiration for any courage and progressive spirit that may have been shown by our county court. If that courage and progressiveness could only be tempered with more caution for the county's interests, and with sounder business judgment, we would bring nothing but praise.

"In as much as other work demands the time of the district attorney, and in as much as we wish later to review the work of the expert who is checking up the county books, we adjourn to adjourn to a future date."

The transactions of the county court with the Northwest Steel company in the buying of steel for the new county court house and the buying of culverts are the only subjects considered by the grand jury. While the grand jury admits that their original report of condemnation was incorrect in some minor points, in general the report this afternoon insists that the original charge was correct.

The Klamath county jury, after being in session since Wednesday morning, on the latest lap, is expected to report late this afternoon. Bailiff North made a hurried trip to Judge Benson's chambers about 4:50 this afternoon, and it is surmised that the purpose of his trip was to notify the judge that the jury would report tonight.

Visitors to the Odd Fellows' building, where the grand jury is in session, were surprised at the loud voices coming from the grand jury room. It was clearly indicated that the members of the grand jury and the county attorney are not entirely in accord.

Judge Worden is seriously ill at the home of his father. This afternoon it was reported that he was resting easy.

SEE DISCRIMINATION IN GAME LAWS

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opening the deer season in this district.

This, in the opinion of Klamath Falls men, is an effort to discriminate against Eastern Oregon. Telegrams are being sent today to the members of the house of representatives from Eastern Oregon, urging them to have this part of the measure changed.

Among the other changes is the changing of the opening of the duck season from September 1st to September 15th. The close of the season is two weeks later than heretofore. The grouse season, under the bill, is from September 1st to October 31st.

Under the new measure, the trout season is open from April 1st to October 31st. The limit hereafter is 75 trout, or 30 pounds of fish for one day. This is larger than before.

A change is made in the fishing season in Klamath county, and if the measure passes early spring fishing will not be permissible in Link River, where the season is open at present from September 1st to June 1st. Under the new legislation the season would be open from April 1st to February 28th.

In addition to Link River, fishing, by the terms of this bill, will be permitted during that time in Upper and Lower Klamath Lakes, Klamath and Lost Rivers. Heretofore these streams have been closed in compliance with the closed season all over the state.

Another change made is in the number of fish that may be caught in these streams. Instead of twenty fish or twenty-five pounds of trout, as formerly, the proposed limit is forty fish of fifty pounds in any one day.

JOHNSON DOES NOT GAIN PROFIT

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Oregon line, and near Klamath Falls. The Hopkins estate claims about 15,000 acres of this land, and, by the decision just rendered, will receive patent.

This decision means that patents covering the lands will be issued in their order by the interior department, and holders of these lands who acquired them from California will have their titles validated by the United States government. Practically 400,000 acres of some of the most valuable lands in the state are included in the secretary's decision.

Title to nearly half of these lands has been tied up by the Lake and other suits. Lake and the other protestants alleged that the lands in question did not come under operation of the lien law. Lake's protest, filed in 1910, caused the interior department in 1911 to suspend any further California school land selections, pending settlement of the dispute.

Louis B. Glavin is alleged to have played a prominent part in the controversy. After the interior department issued its order holding up further selections, S. O. Johnson, reported to be acting for Glavin, tried to obtain from owners of the lands in dispute contracts to validate their patents from the land office of the interior department. Lands involved in the Lake protests were the principal object of the offers to validate patents.

Johnson wanted the holders of these lands to pay \$4.50 per acre for obtaining the patents. On lands not involved in the Lake protests a fee of \$2.50 per acre was asked. Some contracts were obtained on this basis, valuers on the Lake claims being

promised. Should payments for all the lands in question have been made to secure title, Johnson and those associated with him would have received \$1,300,000. Secretary Fisher's order prevents this enormous profit from going into the pockets of Johnson and others.
