WOULD INCREASE ARMY'S STRENGTH

**CHIEF OF STAFF WANTS TWO
REGIMENTS OF INFANTRY AND
SIX FIELD ARTILLERY BAT-
TERIES ADDED TO THE PRE-
SENT ROSTER**

WASHINGTON, March 1.—Fifteen
years ago, before the Spanish war,
there were twenty-five regiments of
infantry in the army, all stationed in
the United States. Since that time
five regiments have been added to the
army, but with these only sixteen are
available for service in this country,
and around which an army could be
built in a sudden emergency.

Of the infantry regiments four are
stationed in the Philippines, six are
to be sent to Hawaii, three to Panama
and one will remain in Alaska. While
the sixteen regiments may be suffi-
cient to garrison the different posts
where they are stationed, they are
not sufficient to form tactical units
where officers may gain experience
and where soldiers may be trained.
The chief of staff of the army has
recommended an increase of two reg-
iments and six batteries of field artil-
lery in order to bring the military
strength up to the point where it will
partially meet the requirements of
the service.
