torneys unanimously agree that as the error in the original document is duplicated in the published book, there can be no question of the validity of the measure. On the other hand, had the printer corrected the error and turned out a book for the information of the voters that differed from the document on file in the city recorder's office, there would have been a grave question as to the legality of the charter.

The error which has been discovered by "Disension" Sam is of minor consideration. Article Six is merely mislabeled Article Five.

The Herald does not attempt to dictate to voters as to the proper course in passing on the proposed charter at the polls. Every voter has received a copy of the measure, and The Herald is willing to leave the decision to the intelligence of the voters.

MURRAY ANSWERS LETTERS

To the City Council
I would urge the city council to take a hand in the matter of the submission of the new charter, and stop the holding of the election, in view of the vital defect discovered in the omission of that portion of the charter indexed as Article V. of Chapter VI. This defect raises a serious legal question, that will compel the submission of the charter to the supreme court, in case of adoption. I would suggest that the council stop the expense of holding an election that at the best will pass on a questionable instrument, and instruct the city attorney to go ahead with the appeal in the commission charter case. If this is done the question will be settled inside of three weeks.

Reply to Citizen
Aside from saying that I never have admitted that the Manning-Sanderson charter was a legal charter, I must decline to reply further to the letter of "Citizen." If he will come out from behind his mask and sign his own name I will be glad to take up and discuss his communication. I like to know with whom I am discussing a question, and I think the people would like to know the identity of this writer, so they may see whether he is serving other "interests" than a desire to secure for the city a legal charter.

Reply to Mr. Leavitt
In Mr. Leavitt's last letter he sings the praises of the provision in the new charter providing for the placing of the city on a cash basis after July 1, 1913. This same provision was in the Manning-Sanderson charter, except that it placed the limit at January 1, 1913. It was taken from the commission charter, the provisions of which on this point are drastic and clearly in the interests of the people. Why, then, did not the present council follow out the provisions of the Manning-Sanderson charter? Because the present city administration recognized that the Manning-Sanderson charter was illegal. What caused the Manning-Sanderson charter to be illegal? Because it was adopted while the commission charter was pending as an initiative measure. If the commission charter was not a legal measure, as they claim, why does the present city administration fear the legality of the Manning-Sanderson charter? For if the commission charter was illegal, it must follow as a fact that the Manning-Sanderson charter was a legal document. But the city administration KNOWS that the Manning-Sanderson charter is illegal, and for the reason that the commission charter was LEGALLY adopted by a majority of the voters voting at the election on May 20, 1912. That being the case, what has that to do with the present charter?

If, as I am morally certain is the case, the commission charter was legally adopted, the only duty that the present council had any authority to perform was the calling of an

election to elect the three commissioners, and every act, other than this, is absolutely illegal. That being the case, what do you expect can be done by passing the new charter? You will only have another charter to be passed upon by the courts, further complicating the situation and effectually stopping any progress this summer.

One of the reasons I am so desirous of seeing the new charter defeated is that it will FORCE THE PRESENT CITY ADMINISTRATION TO GET A QUICK SETTLEMENT OF THE QUESTION BEFORE THE SUPREME COURT, and unless it is FORCED TO ACT it will do as it has done for the past nine months—nothing.

I want to ask the voters of this city if this is not a fair proposition.

Some one of the charters already adopted is a legal charter. That must be admitted. Well, is it not better to take the matter before the supreme court and ascertain WHICH CHARTER THAT IS, and definitely settle the question? This course must be followed before anything can be done in the way of selling bonds and carrying on city improvements. If the city administration is willing to be fair in this matter it can get an immediate

hearing inside of three weeks. It will have to act along this line if the new charter is defeated, and don't you think that it is better to defeat the new charter and finally settle the question by getting an immediate adjustment of the situation from the supreme court?

If the supreme court upholds the Manning-Sanderson charter, we will then have the new charter, for it is substantially the same thing, with the exception that we will be saved from fifty-year franchise grab and one or two other iniquitous features. Everyone will be satisfied, and the city will go ahead. If the court upholds the commission charter, we will have a better charter, and everyone will believe, be satisfied.

Think this over, Mr. Voter. It is a serious question. You and I are each equally and vitally interested, and if you go into this question passionately, laying aside all considerations except the one—the getting of a legal charter—I am satisfied that you can reach but one conclusion: that of voting against the new charter. The city administration will then be forced to act, and if it does not, then there is a quick remedy to make them move.
