MURRAY WRITES ABOUT CHARTER

If there was any other one thing that would justify the voters of this city in turning down the new charter it is the omission of Article V, Chapter VI—that part of the charter providing for the construction of sidewalks. For two years this city has been in the free delivery class, but the postoffice department refuses to do anything towards establishing such a system until the city is adequately provided with sidewalks. As a consequence, the people from all parts of the city are compelled to trudge to the postoffice every day, in all kinds of weather, and wait for long periods of time at the delivery window, while the scores of inquirers are being served. This is a condition that has produced an intolerable hardship, and one that is in urgent need of relief. It would take three months at least before the necessary legislation could be adopted to make it possible for the city to compel the construction of sidewalks, even if immediate steps were taken looking towards an amendment to the charter, in case of its adoption by the voters of the city. If the commission charter is recognized adequate provision is contained therein to cover this question, and little delay need ensue.

In view of this condition of affairs, I would suggest to the council that it DIRECT the attorneys who have represented the city in the charter case to proceed IMMEDIATELY with the appeal to the supreme court, and seek a solution of the charter muddle before that tribunal. If this course is followed and the proper representations made to that body, an immediate hearing can be secured, and the question decided within a comparatively few days. In the meantime the people will take care of the new charter at the election next Monday. The sentiment already is overwhelmingly against the new instrument, and this new defect practically insures its defeat by an almost unanimous vote.

Some have asked why Messrs. Rabbes and Leonard have not taken the appeal. As a matter of fact they have always intended to do so, and the papers in the case are now ready. But do you not think that it is placing a burden on the shoulders of a few for the benefit of the many? Is it not the duty of the entire city to maintain the expense of such a suit? Already the expense has been heavy, and that to be incurred by an appeal will make a load that the city should not ask a few to carry. The council should direct the attorneys on both sides of the case to proceed and meet the expense out of the city's funds. I am sure no one will object to such a proceeding, and it is but fair that such a course should be followed.

The council is called upon to meet a critical situation in the city's affairs, and the members should not stand on ceremony or personal consideration in the matter. The people of the city had confidence in the ability, wisdom and integrity of the men composing the council, or they would not have been elected. They were chosen under conditions that emphasize this fact. Are they going to be disappointed in their judgment? I think not.
