WILSON'S CABINET IS NAMELESS TODAY

list. He did not desire a cabinet position.
"I then offered him one of the principal diplomatic posts, and am still hoping he will accept."
After President Wilson had accepted the resignations of the old cabinet officials, the new cabinet assembled at 10 o'clock.
Garrison and Daniels were the first arrivals.
Bryan and Lane chatted with the assembled army of reporters, the commoner stating that he felt perfectly at home in the White House.
Vice President Marshall was unable to attend.
It was reported that Louis Brandeis will be named interstate commerce commissioner to direct the investigation into the physical valuation of railroads as a basis for the regulation of rates.

Orator, lawyer, statesman, advocate of world peace and veteran of the Spanish American war, Colonel William Jennings Bryan brings to the cabinet one of the strongest personalities in America. His career has been one of the most wonderful in the history of the country.
Three times candidate for the presidency, Bryan was thrice defeated, but still held his place in the councils of his party. At the Baltimore convention he was the dominant factor. Although his enemies declared that he was trying to bring about a situation which would result in his own nomination, he fought his battle along a definite line and gained the most sweeping victory ever known in America after having been apparently crushed under the weight of a great political machine which had planned to write a reactionary platform and nominate a "safe and sane candidate." No one who listened to it will ever forget Bryan's bitter denunciation of Murphy, Morgan, Ryan, Belmont and "the interests," or the manner in which, by sheer weight of personality, he forced through the "declaration of independence" which pledged democracy to refuse to support any candidate acceptable to Wall Street.

Bryan left the convention hall in Baltimore a victor, and immediately got on the firing line for the candidate whose nomination he had made possible. Today's appointment indicates that President-elect Wilson is convinced that Bryan's action was prompted by public duty, and not by selfish ambition.
Bryan was born at Salem, Illinois, in 1860, his father being Judge Elias Lillard Bryan, from whom the Colonel inherited his deeply religious views and convictions. He was graduated from Illinois college at Jack-

sonville, Ill., at the age of 21, and married a classmate, Miss Mary Elizabeth Baird, who has since been his right hand in all of his work.
His career is too well known to need repetition. Honored at home and abroad, Bryan has advanced with the times, and his friends say that he will bring to his new post a seal and determination that should prove of incalculable benefit to the next administration.

The dream of a tunnel under the Hudson River was one which agitated engineers for years, but several futile attempts scared most of them off, and it was finally left for a tall, slender young lawyer to make the dream an actuality. And the Hudson and Manhattan Railway, which operates trains from Jersey into the heart of the "white light" district of New York will always be the monument of William Gibbs McAdoo, who today leaves his pet project to work for the people of the United States in President Wilson's cabinet. McAdoo is one of the most tireless workers the great metropolis has ever known.

McAdoo was born in Marietta, Ga., on October 31, 1863. He was educated at the University of Tennessee, and in November, 1885, was made deputy clerk of the United States circuit court for the Southern district of Tennessee. He studied law and was admitted to the bar in 1885, practicing in Chattanooga and becoming council for the Central Railroad and Banking company and the Richmond and Danville railroad.
The choicest Southern dialect in the new cabinet will be furnished by Albert Sidney Burleson of Austin, Tex. He has achieved a reputation in congress as a firebrand orator, and as the wearer of the most comfortable looking summer clothes of any legislator—said garments being a washable blue jeans sort of stuff that hangs loosely about Burleson's spare frame. Burleson is a planter and a lawyer. He is 50 years of age, and was born at San Marcos, Tex. He was educated at the Texas Agricultural and Mechanical college, Baylor University, and the University of Texas, and started law practice in 1883. For six years he served as assistant city attorney of Austin, and was appointed states attorney in 1891 and elected to that place for three terms. He first came to congress in 1898.
A real newspaper editor was honored when President Wilson named Josephus Daniels for his cabinet.
"Joe" Daniels, as his friends know him, is one of the most successful of Southern editors. Incidentally he is also a lawyer, and legal friends who are in close touch with him

Daniels was born in Washington, N. C., on May 18, 1862, and received his education in the Wilson, N. C. Collegiate Institute, becoming editor of the Wilson Advance when only 18 years old. He became editor of the Raleigh State Chronicle in 1885, and remained in that post until 1894, when he consolidated the Chronicle with the News and Observer. Since then he has been editor of the paper.

The announcement that Franklin K. Lane has been appointed secretary of the interior by President Wilson will be received with delight by the entire West, as it means the recognition of this section of the country. A campaign for a Western man at the head of the department of the interior was started immediately after Wilson's election, on account of the necessity of a man thoroughly acquainted with Western conditions being at the head of a department whose policy, in a large measure, will affect the development of this section.

Lane is a native of California, and for years he has dominated democratic politics in the Golden state. He was selected by President Taft as a member of the interstate commerce commission, and although not chairman of that body, he has been considered one of its strongest members.
