WHITE SLAVE INVESTIGATION BRINGS OUT TRUTH

Working Women in Chicago Are Said to Be Underfed, Many of Them Getting Only Two Scant Meals a Day—Matter Is to Be Probed to the Bottom, Regardless of Who is Hit in the Process

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., March 6.—Over 50,000 women who are working in Chicago receive less than \$5 a week, according to a report tendered to Lieutenant Governor O'Hara by M. Blair Coan, chief investigator of the white slave commission appointed by the Illinois legislature.

"The women are generally underfed," said O'Hara today. "The majority of the poor creatures do not know what a square meal means, while half of them get but two meals a day. "That's the situation at present. Is it any wonder than women in the big cities go wrong? I am determined to disclose all the facts in connection, regardless of who we hit."

CHICAGO, March 6.—Fifteen heads of department stores and mail order houses have been summoned to appear before the legislative white slave investigation committee tomorrow.

Later, it is the intention to examine wholesale clothing manufacturers and other garment makers.

Julius Rosenwald, head of the firm of Sears, Roebuck & Co., will be the first witness examined when the committee commences its session tomorrow.

Thirty girls, employees of department stores, have also been summoned to testify.

Lipton Seeks to Get Cup From Americans

Shamrock IV or New Boat Will be Used by British Yachtsman. A Challenge is Issued America

NEW YORK, March 6.—Another challenge for an international yacht race has been issued by Sir Thomas Lipton, the British sportsman, who has built several fast boats in the hopes of winning the America cup from the United States.

The challenge issued by Lipton has been received by the National Yacht Club. The deal will be considered at a special meeting of the executive board March 27th. It is believed that Lipton will be in America by that time.

The general opinion in local circles is that the Reliance will again defend the cup. Lipton is said to be undecided whether to use the Shamrock IV, which was defeated in the last race by the Reliance, or to build a new yacht.

BUSINESS MEN AROUSED OVER FRAUD CHARGES

ATTEMPT OF MORNING PAPER TO DECEIVE FAILS

Number of Real Subscribers to the Northwestern is Rapidly Diminishing and the End of Deception Now Seems in Sight—Details of Sammy's Scheme Are Given a Little Publicity

At an informal meeting of Klamath Falls business men this morning the question of repudiating advertising contracts with the Northwestern was discussed. While no definite conclusion was reached, it seemed to be the consensus of opinion that, as the contracts had been obtained by fraud, there was no obligation on the part of the local business men to continue to pay for something which they are not receiving, even though contracts have been signed.

It appears that the Northwestern represented to local business men that the circulation of the morning paper was almost 1,400, and, on the basis of this circulation, contracts were made. Tuesday Sam Evans, editor and proprietor of the morning paper, filed with the county court an affidavit showing that the total circulation of the daily edition of the Northwestern and the weekly edition amounted to only 577 in Klamath county.

This affidavit proved a great surprise to local advertisers who had been misled into making contracts. Legal advice was at once taken, and it was that there can be nothing binding because of the apparent fraud.

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TURK CRUISER IS STILL VICTORIOUS

THREE GREEK TRANSPORTS, WITH ALL ABOARD, GO TO THE BOTTOM AS RESULT OF AN ATTACK

SHERIFF USES HONOR SYSTEM

COUNTY PRISONERS AT KELLY'S BUTTE HAVE BUT ONE GUARD TO WATCH OVER THEM—CONVICTS ENFORCE DISCIPLINE

PORTLAND, March 6.—Sheriff Tom Word has adopted a modified "honor system" as Kelly Butte. The other day he lined up thirty-two prisoners within the stockade and notified them that active stone-breaking would begin shortly.

"Do any of you fellows expect to cut and run if you get a chance?" asked the sheriff. They all disclaimed the intention.

"Because if you do," continued the sheriff, "I want to know it now. When I turn you into the stockade there will be only one guard, instead of four or five guards with shotguns. I'm going to make you responsible for all escapes, and I expect you to live up to your agreement."

"That's all right, sheriff," replied one of the prisoners. "If anyone gets away we will go after him and give him a ducking when we get him back."

ILLUMINATION TO BE FEATURE

NOVEL METHODS WILL BE USED FOR LIGHTING AT THE PANAMA-PACIFIC INTERNATIONAL EXPOSITION IN 1915

SAN FRANCISCO, March 6.—The illumination of the Panama-Pacific International exposition will form a remarkable attraction. The work is under the direction of Mr. W. D.A. Ryan, in charge of the lighting of the Panama canal, and who has perfected a scheme enabling him to produce light effects undreamed of at any of the former world's expositions.

In the exposition there will not be a single article of lighting equipment that was ever used before. A sum exceeding \$50,000 has been expended in a single line of experiments in the development of cut glass reflectors, to be known as jewels, for use at the exposition. The results to be produced for their reflected light will be of a startling and scientifically wonderful nature.

MARK HOWARD SAYS KLAMATH COUNTY HORSES WERE WELL ABOVE THE AVERAGE BUCKERS IN SOUTH

"The Klamath county horses were away above the average bucking stock," says Mark Howard, who returned last night from Los Angeles, where he was in charge of the Elk's bronchos. "With a little more training Square Deal will be just as accomplished a man thrower as Cyclone, while White Pelican and Cheyenne also proved terrors to riders."

"Everytime Square Deal started to buck the rider left the saddle," continued Howard. "The horse had such a variety of twists, sunfishings and jumps that it was impossible to stay aboard him. Just look at this," and Howard produced a snapshot showing Hoxie, the Mexican yacouero, clinging timorously to his seat, while Square Deal sunfished and stood on one forefoot. "The next time the

horse hit the ground," he added, "his pose was directly opposite, and Hoxie left the saddle."

According to Howard, the trio trio of horses sent to the Los Angeles Rodeo by the Elks proved a great advertisement for the local Rodeo, and he says there will be riders from all over the Southwest here to compete for the prizes. He expresses a belief that the Elks, with the horses and riders available here can put on a show the equal, if not better than the Los Angeles Rodeo.

The Klamath county horses are now with the Municipal Amusement company, and will be shipped to Dallas, Texas, for the rodeo there. Howard says several tempting offers have been made for the trio, but he declares it would be foolish for the Elks to dispose of them.
