It is believed that the actual circulation of the Weekly Northwestern is about 160. Deducting this from the number sworn to by San Evans, the actual circulation of the morning paper in Klamath county is but 410.

In view of the fact that Mr. Evans has taken a peculiar view of the definition of "bona fide" circulation, there may be additional developments, and it may develop that the sworn list of 577 may be cut down considerably.

"This surely cannot be construed as a bona fide subscriber," said Mr. Evans at the meeting of the county court Tuesday, pointing out the name of the Merrill Record on the list furnished by the Klamath Republican.

"If the Merrill Record is on that list it is a mistake," replied the representative of W. O. Smith, manager of the Klamath Republican. "I would like to change that."

A minute or two later Mr. Evans' attention was called to the fact that on his list was the name of The Herald.

"What about that, Mr. Evans?" the youthful editor, manager, managing editor and proprietor of the Northwestern was asked.

"That's all right," was the reply. "The Herald is a bona fide subscriber. It's paid for."

"Who pays for it?" was asked.

"I charge it to myself," replied Mr. Evans, in his characteristic manner. The Herald has never paid the Northwestern for subscription, and believes that the welfare of this paper is not dependent on the receipt daily of the morning paper or the goodness of heart of Sam Evans.

But if it should develop that Mr. Evans' reasoning is right, then The Herald or any other newspaper might at any time acquire a great circulation by simply putting a bunch of money on one side of the subscription ledger, the same amount on the other side, and then sending the paper to a selected list of names.

FALLS 17 FLOORS; SMOOKES CIGARET

NEW YORK, March 4.—John Brunnon, a marble worker, fell from the 17th floor of the Municipal building to the bottom of an elevator shaft and treated his experience so lightly that those who ran to his aid found him rolling a cigarette and casually inquiring if an ambulance could be summoned. Much shorter falls have taken scores of lives on the recent skyscraper buildings, but Brunnon was saved from being dashed to pieces because he landed on a bundle of empty sacks. He suffered fractures of the leg bones and a slight scalp wound, but will recover.

MAIL CARRIER ALWAYS WANTED

VERNONIA, Ore., March 6.—Probably no other mail route in the state of Oregon has had as many different mail carriers within ten months' time as has the route from Vernonia to Buxton, twenty miles distance.

When the present carrier commenced work about ten days ago he made the nineteenth carrier within ten months. As many as three different carriers have been on the route within a week's time.

It is a hard route, and the carrier is obliged to make the round trip in a very few hours. The present carrier is making the best time of anyone yet, and he probably will remain for some time.

ST. ANTHONY, Idaho, March 6.—A carload of wild elk passed through here this morning for Joseph, Ore. The animals came from Jackson Hole, Wyo., and are in prime condition. The shipment is in charge of a deputy game warden from Oregon, and he expects to reach La Grande tonight and Joseph on Friday. The elk are all young, and the men in charge say they are even better than the herd received last year in Oregon. They will be placed in the big pasture in Oregon.

## LAKE WOOLMEM WILL ORGANIZE

ASSOCIATION TO BE FORMED NEXT MONTH—WILL BE AFFILIATED WITH THE STATE AND NATIONAL BODIES

LAKEVIEW, March 7.—A meeting of the local sheepmen, at which about twenty were present, was held last week in the court house here. The meeting was called for the purpose of perfecting plans for a permanent wool growers association, and to that end Dr. Lyons and Charles Arthur were appointed a committee to get in touch with the national and state wool growers associations, and to issue invitations to all of the sheepmen of this locality to be present at a meeting which will be held April 5th, at which time plans will be perfected for the formation of a permanent association.

An effort should be made by all sheepmen throughout this section to be present at such time, as the objects of the association are worthy ones, and much benefit will be obtained by membership in same.

PORTLAND, March 6.—Judge Bean in the United States district court sustained the suit of the California-Oregon Power company of Grants Pass to enjoin the city from enforcing a rate schedule ordinance, recently passed. The electric company recently filed its schedule of rates with the state railroad commission, as specified by law. The Grants Pass city council, January 15th, passed an ordinance, forbidding the enforcement of that rate by the company, and imposing a new schedule.

The California-Oregon Power company recently became the assignee of the Rogue River Electric company, which corporation, in the spring of 1910, made a contract with the city of Grants Pass, fixing terms and rates for supplying power for the next ten years. This was the schedule submitted to the railroad commission, and which the city recently objected to.

TEN THOUSAND FIGHTING MEN ARE AVAILABLE TO MARCH AGAINST FEDERALS—HUERTA WEAKENING
