SAN FRANCISCO, March 7.—After nearly a year of negotiations between the exposition management and the National Association of Automobile Manufacturers, an agreement has been reached under which there will be a palace erected solely devoted to the exhibition of automobiles and what pertains to automobiles. This palace will be erected at a cost of several hundred thousands of dollars, it will cover an area of about 210,000 square feet, or more than five acres. It will be about four times as large as the Coliseum at Chicago, and in it we could put four or five Madison Square Gardens of New York. No single industry has ever presented an exhibit on half so vast a scale.

THOUSANDS OF MEN AND TEAMS ARE EMPLOYED IN THE TASK OF PREPARING THE EMBANKMENTS FOR THE 1915 WORLD'S FAIR

SAN FRANCISCO, March 7.—Harbor View, the site of the Panama-Pacific International Exposition, which covers an area of 625 acres stretching along the shores of San Francisco Bay for a distance of three miles to the famous Golden Gate at the edge of the Pacific ocean, presents a scene of lively activity today.
Thousands of men and teams are at work. Several hundred acres of land have been filled in, graded and laid with roadways and railroad tracks along the bay shore which forms the northern boundary of the exposition grounds. Steam cranes, dredges, motors and mule teams by the hundred are at work in the building preparations now making great strides at Harbor View. Millions of feet of lumber are being unloaded on the exposition site. The buildings are fast being raised, giving, as yet, but a faint impression of the beauties that are to be.

BLUE SKY SUITE BEING PREPARED

OFFICES FOR NEW CORPORATION DEPARTMENT BEING ARRANGED—WILL HAVE CHARGE OF BILL'S ENFORCEMENT
SALEM, March 7.—Offices are being fitted up here for a new corporation department which will have charge of the enforcement of the new "Blue Sky" law passed by the legislature.
The "Blue Sky" law was introduced by Representative Mitchell. It provides that no corporation or stock broker shall sell or negotiate for the sale of stocks, bonds or other securities without securing a permit from the corporation department.
