NO APOLOGY NEEDED

THERE should be no apology necessary for the criticism of public officials if such criticism is true, and not made in a spirit of malice. The editor of this paper was honored by being selected to represent this district in the legislature, and now that the session is over, it is only proper that his record should be considered, and he should be judged accordingly.

The editorial statement in the Northwestern that W. O. Smith and W. Lair Thompson voted against the interests of the people on nearly every roll call is absolutely untrue, and is evidence of the ignorance of the writer as to the business transacted by the recent legislature.

W. Lair Thompson was recognized as one of the most able members of the senate, and he was instrumental in securing the passage of many of the most important pieces of constructive legislation enacted by the legislature. Mr. Thompson was one of the authors of Senate Bill 73, known as the agricultural extension bill. This is one of the most progressive measures passed for the development of the state and benefit of the farmers, and utmost credit is due Mr. Thompson for its success.

Members of the legislature as well as the people of the state of Oregon have every reason to feel proud over the achievement of the session just closed in the passage of real constructive legislation. Before anyone attempts to criticize the actions of the legislature we would advise them to make an examination of the measures which have been enacted into laws. 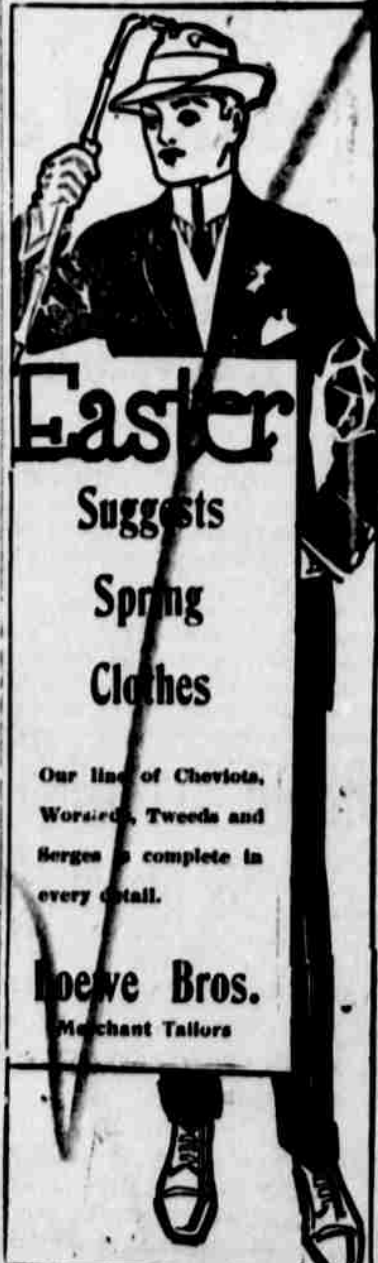
