POLISH OUTBREAK SCARES AUSTRIA

According to the "Zeit," the Poles claim they are merely organizing for the protection of their homes and their property in the event of a war with Russia. It is feared, however, that a Polish revolution is being planned.

NO DISSECTING OF PUBLIC SICK

GERMAN GOVERNMENT TAKES A STRONG STAND AGAINST RESEARCH TENDENCIES OF THE MEDICAL MEN

United Press Service BERLIN, March 12.—The government is taking a strong stand against what is declared to be many violations of physicians in using the sick in public and state institutions as "experimental material." Privy Councillor Doctor Bumme, head of the imperial health department, in an address to the petitions committee of the reichstag, declared that many experiments upon the sick were useless from a scientific standpoint, and contrary to personal rights.

INCORPORATION TALKED AT FORT

WOOD RIVER VALLEY METROPOLIS RESIDENTS WILL CONSIDER MATTER FURTHER AT A MEETING TUESDAY

Special to The Herald. FORT KLAMATH, March 12.—A meeting of this place was held on Monday at Loosley hall to talk over the question of incorporating the town. O. B. Bunch was made chairman pro tem., and he called for talks from the various ones present. Ben Loosley first responded, followed by Tom Jackson, Mr. Gardner, Jim Gordon, Rev. Worral, Mr. Page, Mr. Dimes, E. Smith, Mr. Voss, Brophy, and others.

The speakers took up the various questions, difficulties and advantages relative to incorporated towns. There were talks both pro and con, but the prevailing sentiment seems to be one of cautiousness. The majority of the people present have the progressive spirit, but a decision seemed to be reached that no movement whatever would be taken until all details and facts relative to incorporation was secured, and then at a later mass meeting of the town, a vote would be taken on a canvass be made of the voters of the town to see if a majority were in favor or not. The meeting adjourned to meet at Loosley hall March 13th, at 7:30 p.m., at which time Attorney Manning of Klamath Falls will be present. Fort Klamath, the heart of Wood River Valley, is destined to progress or to fizzle. Which will it do? It is a business proposition to spend a dollar if it will make two.

SYSTEMATIZE THE COUNTY BUSINESS

THREE BILLS PASSED AT RECENT SESSION OF LEGISLATURE WILL OVERCOME MANY OF THE OBJECTIONS

Three important bills were passed at the recent session of the legislature which is believed will overcome many of the complaints and objections against the present method of conducting the business of the county. One of the bills provides that all road work in any district amounting to \$1,000 or over shall be let by contract. The other two bills were introduced by W. O. Smith. H. B. 206 provides for an annual budget to be made by the county court setting forth an itemized statement of the proposed expenditures for the coming year. After this budget is published a meeting is held at which any objections on the part of the taxpayers can be heard. This procedure is in accordance with the custom in all of the modern cities, and gives the taxpayer information in advance as to what use is to be made of the money raised from the tax levy. H. B. 419 provides for a uniform system of bookkeeping and accounting for all of the county officers of the state and all state institutions, and also for an annual experting of the books of all such officers. After a system of accounting is installed on January 1st, a state official may drop in at any time and check up the books of any county official, the same as the state bank examiner does with the banks. At the present time it can hardly be said that any system is followed by the county clerks or other county officers of the state, and whenever a new official goes into office he is liable to adopt some system of his own. Thus the methods of keeping the accounts of the business of the counties is continually changing, and it is impossible for the taxpayers to get any intelligent idea of how their money is being spent. When these new measures go into effect all this will be changed. A uniform system for all of the officers in the state will be installed, and instead of taking two or three months to expert the books of a county these books can be checked in a few days and at a very much less cost than at present. The taxpayers will be enabled to know what things are being spent and just how their money is being spent.
