SEATTLE MAN WAS ONE OF FOUR SURVIVORS OF THE FIGHTERS IN THE REVOLUTIONARY WAR FOR INDEPENDENCE

United Press Service SEATTLE, March 13.—John W. Wallingford, 83 years old, a son of Jonathan Wallingford, who fought in the Revolutionary War, is dead. He was one of only four real survivors of the revolution fighters, and the only one west of the Mississippi River.

NEW LEGISLATION DEVELOPS STATE

GROUND WORK IS LAID TO PERMIT STATE TO MAKE PROPER USE OF ITS LANDS AND ITS WATERS

SALEM, March 13.—With a constitutional amendment giving the state the power to issue bonds to develop irrigation and water power projects, to be submitted to the people at the next general election, and a number of bills passed by the recent legislature paving the way for this amendment, to become effective soon, the state for the first time in its history is in a fair way to bring about a complete development of its great water resources.

Because of the lack of authority to issue bonds for the development of irrigation projects the recent legislature had to appropriate \$460,000 to take over and reclaim the lands in the Columbia Southern project, which from the beginning has been a failure in private hands. The state desert land board will have control of the work, and it promises to become a mammoth task. Much depends upon making it a complete success, for if it is demonstrated that the state can take over this project and reclaim the lands, the people will not only be in favor of the constitutional amendment, but will favor the issuance of bonds to reclaim lands in other projects which the state may desire to take over.

Another important piece of legislation which paves the way for this amendment is a bill appropriating \$50,000 to investigate the irrigation and power possibilities of the Deschutes River and other streams of the state. The government has appropriated a like sum, and the work is to be done in co-operation with the United States reclamation bureau. The government has already forwarded the contract to the state engineer for his signature, but as it calls for an investigation of the Deschutes River alone the latter has delayed signing it, believing that he can secure from the government a contract which will allow a portion of the money to be expended on other streams in the state.
