A number of farmers are in the city today from different parts of the county to attend the auction sale tomorrow at the Miller ranch, adjoining the county poor farm, five miles south of this city.

The sale will start promptly at 12:30.

Considerable interest attaches to the sale because of the high class livestock to be offered for sale. Plans have been made for the entertainment of those who attend the sale, and a free lunch will be served.

Fifty head of horses are included in the list of stock to be sold. These horses consist of Percheron, French coach and a number of good saddle horses, all young and broke.

There will be auctioned twenty head of dairy cattle, cows, heifers and yearlings, and four head of mules.

OXFORD WINS EXCITING RACE

The race was the most spectacular ever witnessed on the Thames. The weather was fine, and there was but little wind.

Cambridge led at the start by a length. At the quarter Oxford spurred, and in the last quarter passed Cambridge.

LUKE WALKER BRINGS ACTION AGAINST HORTON BROTHERS, YONNA VALLEY RANCHERS, FOR RECOVERY

Alleging that Charles Horton and Jack Horton are indebted to him for pasturage of cattle, Luke Walker has commenced suit against the Yonna Valley farmers for \$185.55. The suit was filed in the circuit court today by Kaybendall & Ferguson.

MOTHER JONES' TRIAL IS OVER

COURT MARTIAL DELIBERATING OVER THE FATE OF THE FAMOUS WOMAN AND HER COMPANIONS, ALL MINERS

United Press Service CHARLESTON, W. Va., March 13.—Six members of the court martial are deliberating on the fate of Mother Jones and her companions, who are charged with conspiracy to murder.

The trial ended at midnight. Only two witnesses appeared for the defense.

Mother Jones is seriously ill at Camp Pratt.

If convicted, the court martial is empowered to execute the defendants or send them to jail for life.

A decision will not be rendered before Saturday.

LEGISLATURE PRAISED BY LEAGUE

S. B. 80—Provides that any person, who shall sell intoxicating liquor to any intoxicated person or habitual drunkard shall be liable for all damages resulting therefrom at the suit of wife, husband, parent or child of such intoxicated person or drunkard.

S. B. 84—Prohibits the sale of liquor in any railway, interurban railway or street railway depot after September 1, 1915.

H. B. 150—Adds a jail sentence to the penalty in the present law prohibiting keeping open a saloon or selling liquor on Sunday, and the further provision that a second conviction shall work a forfeiture of the license.

H. B. 222—Amends section 18 of local option law by providing that the issuance of the internal revenue tax stamp for the sale of "Malt" liquor shall be prima facie evidence that such person is selling, exchanging or giving away intoxicating liquor. Also that "all beverages containing more than one per cent by weight of alcohol and fermented cider commonly known as hard cider, and all spirituous, vinous and malt liquor within the meaning of this act."

H. B. 223—Provides that proof of issuance of an internal revenue tax stamp be made by certificate of the collector of internal revenue.

The two bills last above were introduced at request of Mr. Bryson, district attorney of Lane county, who has had much experience in prosecuting boot leggers, and these two laws will aid greatly in getting convictions under the local option law.

H. B. 49—Provides for the enforcing and abating of houses or prostitution as nuisances, and enjoining the persons who conduct or maintain the same, and the owners, lessee or agent of any building maintained for such purposes.

H. B. 178—Makes it a felony for any man to receive money from or habitually associate with common prostitutes.

The city council at Budapest has appropriated \$150,000 for the construction of three municipal homes for domestic servants.

RAILROAD TALK HEARD IN TOWN

REPORT HAS IT THAT CAMP OF 500 MEN WILL BE ESTABLISHED NEAR THIS CITY IN A FEW WEEKS

Sensational stories of proposed railroad construction starting from this city were current on the streets today, but there was no confirmation.

It was reported that a camp of 500 men would be established near this city in a few weeks to start on the construction of a line south to connect with the Hasen branch. This is not credited, as with the report is the information that the line will connect at Alturas.

As a matter of fact the proposed line does not pass through Alturas, but through Susanville, a long distance from Alturas.
