EASTERN OREGON BEST ROUTE

IN AN interview in a Portland paper Samuel Hill, president of the American Road Builders Association, criticizes the disposition of Washington and Oregon to build difficult and expensive mountain roads, and draws attention to the only natural all-the-year route through Eastern Oregon. Mr. Hill says in part:

"Sometimes communities are like children. Seattle is fully resolved that they will build two roads over the Cascade mountains, and not build the Columbia River highway. Portland sees the beautiful Willamette Valley, and says there is only one way out of it, and that is to cross the Siskiyou Mountains into California. Last week I photographed portions of this Siskiyou Mountain route; the snow was deep, and there was not a single wagon track to break the way.

"San Francisco has suddenly waked up and is resolved that there is only one way to San Francisco, and that is to build over the Sierras, notwithstanding the fact that the Union Pacific railway still has forty miles of snowsheds.

"It is a dangerous thing to go into the prophetic business, but from what knowledge of the country I have, which I may say in passing is not small, the only avenues to the north Pacific coast that can be used every day in the year is down the Columbia River, and with the highway on the north bank through Washington, and the highway on the south bank through Oregon to Portland, the people will have ingress and egress every day in the year.

"The only way to enter San Francisco by highway, which can be traveled every day in the year is to go down the Pitt River, and through Eastern Oregon to the East, for example, to Chicago and New York. The other way is to reach San Francisco from the south, but doubtless millions will be spent in trying to fight nature and overcome obstacles. The route over Snoqualmie pass is a beautiful scenic route, and should be built. The road down the beautiful Willamette Valley will be an unrivaled highway, and can be used when finished for ten months in the year, but any one who stops to think will realize that when James J. Hill found it necessary to build the North Bank road, he already had access to the sound by the Great Northern and the Northern Pacific railroads, and when the Southern Pacific road built the Matron cutoff and got east of the mountains they already had the Siskiyou line. There must be some reason why these intelligent men spent these millions of millions of dollars, and the same thing applies to San Francisco, when the parties controlling the Union Pacific sought to acquire the Southern Pacific line and get out the south way."

Herbert C. Plotts is here from Grants Pass, giving attention to business matters. He plans the erection of two new residences on his Hot Springs addition property this year.
