OLEO FRAUDS CANNOT BE EASILY WHITEWASHED

Famous Chicago Jurist Instructs Jury to Disregard the Settlement Effected by the Taft Administration on the Eve of Retiring From Public Life—Manufacturers of Oleo Are Affected.

United Press Service CHICAGO, March 17.—Judge Landis, while instructing a special grand jury called to probe the \$1,250,000 oleo frauds, ordered an investigation not only into the charge against the manufacturers, but against government officials, who, it has been reported, entered into a conspiracy with the manufacturers to defraud the government.

An effort will be made by the Oregon state fish and game commission to secure the co-operation of the California commission in forcing the California-Oregon Power company to make provision for salmon to pass the dam now being constructed in the Klamath River about forty miles from this city and on the California side.

WOMEN TO HAVE OUT LICENSES

NEW LAW REQUIRES THAT, IN ORDER TO FISH IN OREGON, LICENSES MUST BE TAKEN OUT BY WOMEN AS WELL AS MEN

One of the inconveniences of the ballot for women is the requirement that women must secure fishing licenses in order to enjoy the sport. This is the result of the passage of a bill by the last legislature.

Heretofore women have not been required to take out fishing licenses. The new law, which becomes effective June 5, puts women on an equal footing with men, so far as fishing is concerned.

The license fee is \$1 for residents. Foreigners who have not declared their intention to become citizens, are required to pay an extra fee of \$25.

STEER CASE IS AGAIN IN COURT

ANIMAL WHICH CAUSED THE INDICTMENT OF POE VALLEY RANCHER IS BASIS OF SUIT FOR MONEY

The red steer, weight about 900 pounds, that figured in the indictment of W. H. Marcho on a charge of larceny of a steer, and the legal battle between a livestock firm and a Merrill butcher shop for the possession of the animal, is again in court. He is at the bottom of an action against Marcho by the butchers, Dalton & Hooley, which is being tried today.

The animal was sold to the butchers by Marcho, and later an action for claim and delivery was started by Ofheld & Stukel, cattlemen, who charged that the steer belonged to them, and Marcho had no right to sell it.

The case was tried in the justice court here, but the jury failed to agree. The plaintiffs in the case being tried today ask the recovery of the costs of the trial.

Each Member of the Irish Guards is Presented With a Shamrock by Mother Queen. Unusual Interest is Taken in Parades in London, Dublin and Belfast

Parades were held today in Dublin, Cork and all the other important cities, while even in Belfast the populace entered into the observance with a fervor never before noticed. There were a number of parades in different

parts of England. The Irish Guards, stationed at Wellington barracks, were on formal parade in honor of the Patron Saint of Ireland in the presence of Field Marshal Roberts and other Irish notables.
