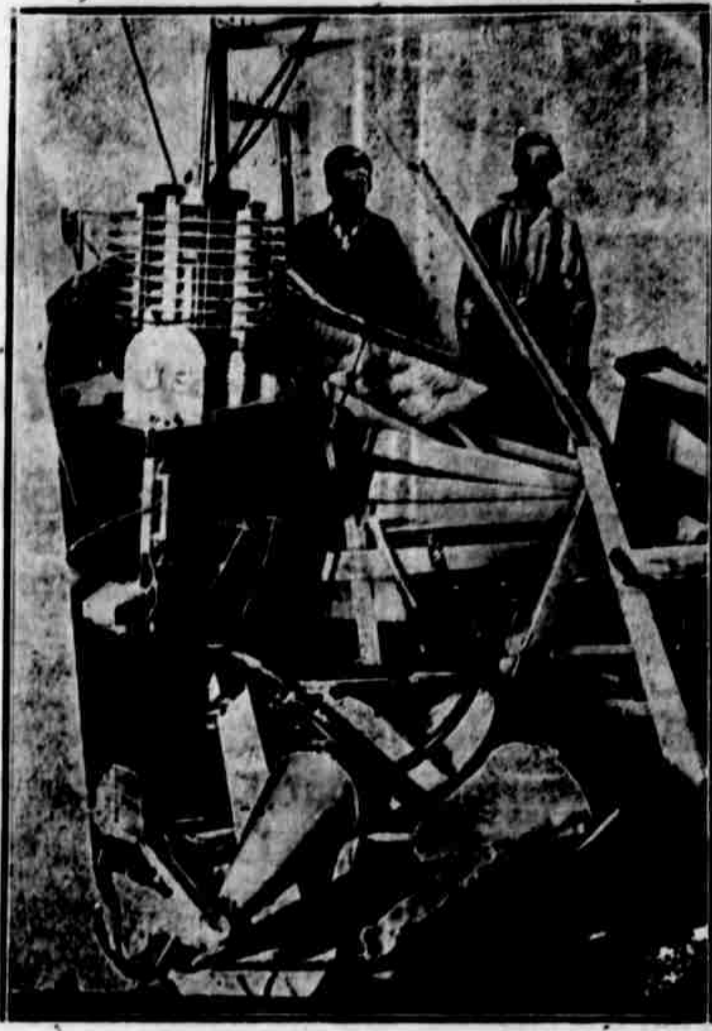

The land is in the vicinity of Buck Lake, and portions of it are heavily timbered. Local people are inclined to believe that only small tracts will be opened for settlement, and that the timbered portions will be retained in the Cascade forest reserve.

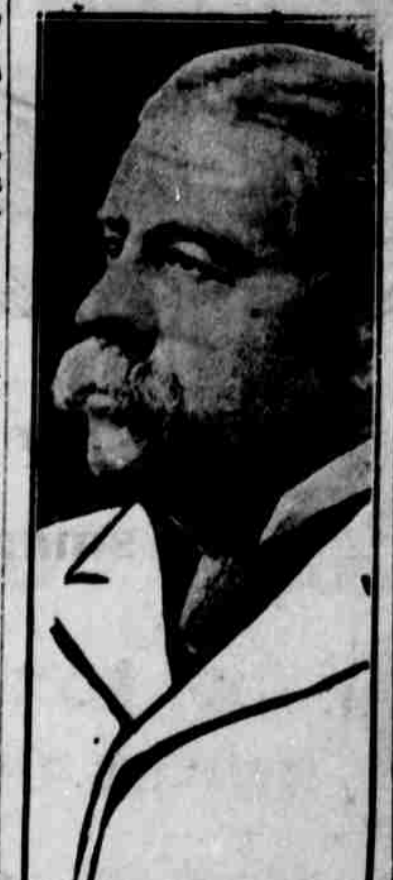

PHONY RINGS GET USURERS

MONEY LENDERS IN LONDON TAKE GLASS DIAMONDS AS SECURITIES FOR BIG SUMS, AND RUN TO SCOTLAND YARD

LONDON, March 15.—Scotland Yard is gradually acquiring a choice collection of "phony" rings, supposedly of American origin, bought in by pawnbrokers who have recently been stung. The rings contain stones actually worth about \$1.25 each, but by means of a special preparation, the secret of which is known to the police, they are given the appearance of genuine diamonds. In a number of instances the exasperated pawnbrokers admitted that the rings had been "hocked" for from \$25 to \$50.

MISS OLD-TIME POSTOFFICE MEET

SO FARMERS IN INDIANA HAVE ARRANGED A RURAL DELIVERY "OFFICE" TO ANSWER THE PURPOSE

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 15.—Farmers and country folk of an Indiana community have "invented" a rural delivery postoffice. The post-office department received word about it today, and thinks the idea is a good one.

When the government abandoned the postoffice at New Market, Clark county, Indiana, and instituted regular rural mail service in its stead, the Hoosiers of that vicinity were not altogether pleased with the change. They missed the old-time social custom of coming together to exchange views on the crops, politics and the weather, while the postmaster leisurely handed out the various letters and packages and read the postal cards.

Oscar Harlan of Marysville came to the rescue with an original suggestion: Why not have all the mail boxes, for some little distance round, at least, centered in one spot, thus preserving something of the spirit of the past. The idea was eagerly seized upon and executed in such a way as to materially assist the rural carrier on this route.

Upon a tree stump, cut down to an appropriate height, an old wagon wheel was set, a big dovell being left in the center of the stump for an axle for the wheel. Mail boxes were nailed upon the rims and spokes. The rural carrier does not have to get out of his rig. He drives up, turns the wheel on its pivot, reaching each of the fourteen boxes in turn. When his rig is sighted it serves as a call signal for the neighborhood.

JURY LIKES WORD OF NEGRO BEST

"HAM" HAMILTON IS ACQUITTED IN JUSTICE COURT OF CHARGES OF SELLING LIQUOR TO AN INDIAN

The word of a negro, unsupported, is worth more in court than the sworn testimony of two Indians, even though their testimony is substantiated by the testimony of white men.

This was the conclusion reached by a jury in Justice Gowen's court last night. The case was one in which J. W. (Ham) Hamilton was charged with illegally selling liquor to an Indian.

District Attorney appeared before a jury for the first time in his official capacity. H. M. Manning defended Hamilton.
