DOCTOR WILEY SCORES PREVALENT ATTITUDE

PURE FOOD DISCIPLE DECLARES SEVERAL STATES SEEM TO VALUE ANIMALS FAR AHEAD OF MANKIND

TACOMA, March 15.—Denouncing the commercialism of the country which makes human life "the cheapest thing in America," Dr. Harvey W. Wiley, former head of the pure food bureau of the government, spoke to a large gathering here.

"Utah appropriated \$35,000 for killing coyotes and \$10,000 for public health," he declared. "Iowa gave \$50,000 to fight hog cholera, and \$10,000 for public health. The same conditions prevail in all states."

Wiley thought the Utah idea that one coyote was worth three men and the Iowa idea of one hog being worth five men was the result of a commercial spirit.

MEN TO CLIMB THE HIMALAYAS

GENOA, Italy, March 15.—Attorney Piacenza, one of the most famous Alpine climbers in Italy, has left here with an extensive expedition to explore portions of the Himalaya mountains hitherto untraversed. The work in a way will be a continuation of the Duke of Abruzzi's explorations. The particular range Piacenza proposes to explore lies north of the glacier of Baltore and includes some of the highest Himalaya peaks. Aside from the "coolies" who will accompany the expedition he will have Dr. Lorenzo Borelli for a collaborator, Count Sesar Calcatti for the making of topographical records and several expert Alpine guides.

FRENCH PEOPLE TO GO BACK TO THE FARM

SOILWARD MOVEMENT IS PROMPTED BY THE DANGER TO THE WINE SUPPLY ON ACCOUNT OF GRAPES

PARIS, March 15.—A general

"back to the country" movement has begun here, following reports that the grape crops are declining on account of lack of sufficient help. Officials here declare that before France's renown as a vintage producing country is jeopardized, soldiers of the republic will be put to work tending the vines.

Reports from Southern France state that many vineyards are being deserted because of the desire of the country populace to seek more urban surroundings. It is also declared that farming under the Southern Britany skies is much easier and more profitable than grapevine tending.

WOULD CUT DOWN MANY ACQUITTALS

FRENCH LAWMAKERS FRAME A MEASURE TO ELIMINATE THE DANGER OF GUILTY ONES GOING SCOTT FREE

PARIS, March 15.—A bill calculated to lessen the widespread acquittal of persons on trial for crimes of passion is introduced into the chambers here today by Deputy Payroux. The bill is an indirect result of the acquittal of Mme. Bloch, who shot and killed Mrs. Minnie Bridgeman, an American woman whom Mme. Bloch charged with having stolen the affections of her husband. Following her acquittal, however, came a wave of leniency so great as to cause a public outburst of which was born the bill. The bill provides a light sentence for such criminals.
