IRWIN IS ATTACKED

JOHN IRWIN, district attorney, is once more subject to public criticism because of the activity of persons who would have it appear that they are his friends. In what purports to be a feature article in the morning paper Sunday, the district attorney is held up to the public gaze as a model of righteousness and ability, and at the same time tried officials of the county are severely criticized.

DRAMATIC TALE TOLD BY CONVICT

MEMBER OF FAMOUS SONTAG-EVANS BAND TELLS OF EFFECT ON FELLOW PRISONER OF HANGINGS

SACRAMENTO, March 24.—A dramatic story of the effects of executions on the prisoners of San Quentin was told here before the senate judiciary committee by Edward H. Morrell, a member of the Sontag-Evans gang of bandits, who served fourteen years in the penitentiary.

"The man, who was my cellmate, worked in the shoe shop directly under the death chamber," said Morrell. "He used to hear the thump of the men dropping through the trap just overhead. For days afterward he appeared to be in a daze. The thing grew on him until one day, with a wild look in his eyes, he shook me roughly and told me I'd better get a new cell mate quickly.

"These things are having a strange suggestive effect on me," said he. "They make me want to do murder. If you don't get away I'll kill you some day."

"He died a raving maniac a little later, the result of the horrible suggestion of the execution chamber."

Taking nine seconds the British Champion rose to meet another right swing to the jaw and he went down and out.

Smith thereby became one of the most popular heavyweights in the United States. He took the place of Wells in popular estimation. The athletic Briton, by his gentlemanly qualities, had won the regard of the fight fans, even though it was doubted if he had stamina for hard fighting. Smith is now considered the logical opponent for Luther McCarty. Should he win from the so-called "white champion" he will probably claim the "white heavyweight" championship of the world.
