LAW MAKING GAMBLING A FELONY IS REPEALED AND TEN-ROUND BOXING MATCHES WILL BE ALLOWED

CARSON, Nev., March 24.—Governor Odde signed the act repealing the law permitting flash fights in this state. The act permits ten-round boxing matches on the payment of a nominal license. He also signed a new anti-gambling act, which amends the law by making poker playing a misdemeanor instead of a felony. Percentage games are made a felony. Gambling with cards formerly permitted was made a misdemeanor.

Final Papers in Big Realty Deal are Signed Today

San Francisco Man Joins With J. F. Maguire of This City in Buying Comstock Hotel Property. Confidence in Klamath Falls is Shown

The final papers were delivered today for the sale of 66 feet of the Bellman property on Main street between Eighth and Ninth streets. The purchasers were H. L. Jones of California, and J. F. Maguire of this city, and the price paid was \$22,100, or at the rate of \$336 a front foot.

The property is now occupied by the Comstock hotel, which is under lease to L. G. Comstock, and will be

continued in operation for the present. This is one of the largest real estate transactions that has taken place in Klamath Falls for some time, and the price paid is evidence of the confidence that the purchasers have in the future of this city. Both Mr. Jones and Mr. Maguire are thoroughly familiar with conditions here. They believe that Klamath Falls will be a big city, and are backing their judgment with their money.

Mr. Bellman still retains 26 feet on the corner adjoining the property sold. He has been here during the past two years, during which time he has made a large number of investments in city property. He stated this morning that he was very much pleased with the outlook for the growth of Klamath Falls, and that the money realized from the sale of this property would not go out of Klamath Falls.

BOOKER T. IS NEGRO EDUCATOR

FAMOUS BLACK MAN TELLS AUDIENCE HOW IT IS PROPOSED TO LIFT HIS RACE UP TO CIVILIZED STANDARD

Explanation of the newer idea in education as they are exemplified at Tuskegee Institute of which he is president, was made by Dr. Booker T. Washington in an address to public school teachers at the Lincoln high school auditorium in Portland.

At his school, Dr. Washington said, the students are not merely taught book learning, but they are rather admonished to prepare themselves for the real problems of life.

"We are shaping the destiny of a race at Tuskegee," he said. "We are a young race, and we are shaping the young people in the way they will grow. We have little past, but our whole future is before us."

Dr. Washington told of the struggle to bring the negro race up from ignorance to a higher plane, and of the efforts to make the people of the race appreciate that in work lies the greatest benefits and joys of life.

"There is a great difference," he said, "between being worked, which is slavery, and working, which is freedom. At Tuskegee we don't call it manual training, and we don't call it domestic science. We call it work."

"We carry this idea out in all branches, and even in the commencement themes which are given by the students at their graduation, we have grown away from the idea of preparing essays on high sounding subjects that do not mean very much, and now confine such papers to subjects in which all are interested, and which appeal to all."

OMAHA, Neb., March 24.—Sixty-five people are dead, 700 seriously injured and a property loss of \$2,000,000 resulted from a cyclone which swept a strip five miles long through the northern part of the city last night.

Four more people are known to be dead in Ralston, a suburb. Reports

from outside towns which the tornado wrecked will probably increase the deaths to more than 100. The scene here this morning revealed desolation.

The tornado entered the city from the southwest. Buildings were picked up and hurled with terrific force.

A torrential rain followed the cyclone. Then a score of fires were started simultaneously. Twenty-five houses were destroyed by flames.

The storm came at 6 o'clock last night. The roar could be heard long before the storm struck.

A great cloud, narrowed to a funnel shape, dipped earthward, and wherever it struck there was destruction.

Every undertaking establishment here and in South Omaha is taxed to the limit in caring for the dead.

State militia, aided by regular troops and the police are guarding the wrecked buildings and searching the ruins.

It is now estimated in some quarters that there are 200 dead.
