The New Interstate Commerce Commission

The Interstate Commerce Commission, which must study the accounts and operation of every railroad in the country which crosses the border of a state, now has before it the largest task undertaken. It must place a physical valuation on every one of these roads. The cost is estimated at

\$5,000,000, for scores of clerks and engineers must be employed for several years in the work.

The Interstate Commerce Commission is complete again since Woodrow Wilson became president. He nominated Edgar E. Clark, the chairman, and the senate quickly confirmed. Then he named John H. Marble, sec-

retary of the commission for the place made vacant when Franklin K. Lane was chosen for the cabinet.

Leishman resisted the attachment on the contention that he is still a resident of Pittsburgh. The New York firm alleged \$70,000 was due from Leishman on stock transactions.
