storm of March 23. For years the old-
timers and their sons and daughters
rested secure in the fact that even if

legend it was a fact that the city had
never become the victim of the wild
storms of the prairies.

Sixteenth street in Omaha was one
of the busiest streets in one of the
busiest cities. It was as lively as
many busy streets of New York or
Chicago. On it were located many
fine stores and buildings. They were
not seriously damaged by the tor-
nado. It swept another part of the
city, and left its ruin a half mile or
more away.

Immediately after the tornado
Mayor James C. Dahlman, the "cow-
boy mayor" of Omaha, went into con-
ference with Governor Moorehead
and business men to make prepara-
tions for relief.

SUFFRAGETTES BUSIED AGAIN

**SPRING CAMPAIGN OF THE NA-
TIONAL ASSOCIATION OPENS.
FLORIDA IS NEXT IN LINE FOR
CAMPAIGNING**

NEW YORK, April 1.—The spring
campaign of the National American
Woman Suffrage Association opened
with a rush yesterday, and according
to the announcement from the New
York headquarters there will be gen-
eral activity throughout the country
until all the legislatures have quit
for their summer vacations. The
votes-for-women bill will be intro-
duced tomorrow in the Florida legis-
lature, where it must pass both
houses before it can go to the people
for ratification.

The Ohio campaign starts tomor-
row for submitting the amendment
by initiative petition. The suffrage
measure is to be resubmitted to the
voters, by legislative enactment, on
April 7th, and state and national lead-
ers are stumping the state to work up
enthusiasm and make converts. The
local leaders are preparing for the on-
slaught against the incoming national
congress.

KLAMATH MAN IN SERIOUS PLIGHT

**FRED REED, FORMERLY A RES-
IDENT OF THIS CITY, IS CHARGED
WITH MANSLAUGHTER IN
COON COUNTY**

MARSHFIELD, April 1.—Involun-
tary manslaughter has been charged
against Fred Reed, the driver of the
automobile which turned over and
killed L. K. Ballinger and badly in-
jured W. R. Haines, two of the occu-
pants.

The coroner called a large number
of witnesses, some of whom testified
that Reed had taken drinks during
the evening before starting with the
passengers on the run to North Bend.
The coroner's jury found that Reed
was driving the car faster than the
speed limit allowed, and that he was
negligent and careless. The jury did
not recommend holding Reed, but im-
mediately after the return of the ver-
dict County Attorney Lillequist filed
in Justice Pennekot's court charges of
involuntary manslaughter. Reed was
arrested and furnished bond of
\$10,000.

Young Reed, who is under arrest
in Marshfield, is the son of Carl Reed,
formerly a resident of Klamath Falls,
and the son lived here several years,
at one time operating a cleaning and
pressing parlor.

**MORSE PROMENADING ON FIFTH
AVENUE**



Charles W. Morse, the New York
financier, lately pardoned from the
federal prison at Atlanta because he
was believed by army surgeons to be
dying, was among the bright and
chipper promenaders Easter Sunday
morning on Fifth avenue. That prom-
inent thoroughfare, as has been the
custom for many years, was crowded
with notables of society and politics.

Morse's trip to Europe and his
business activities in New York since
his return have so built up his health
that to casual observers he showed
no signs of illness.

The banker, who was vice presi-
dent and the controlling power in the
National bank of North America, was
a victim of the panic of 1907. When
the controller of the treasury took
possession of the institution he found
a condition which warranted prosecu-
tion, and was followed by a convic-
tion and a long sentence.

LONG AND SHORT HAUL IS UP NOW

**INTERSTATE COMMERCE COM-
MISSION HEARING ARGUMENTS
IN ONE OF THE MOST INTER-
ESTING RATE DISPUTES**

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 1.—
The much mooted and extremely in-
tricate questions involved in the long-
and-short haul clause of the interstate
commerce law came up for argument
before the Interstate Commerce Com-
mission today.

The case is based on applications
for relief filed by railroads in the
Southern territory on class and
commodity rates from New York city,
Ohio River crossings and New Orleans
to South Atlantic and Gulf ports. The
commission will soon announce its
official decision in the case.

WEST SIDE MILL RUNNING TODAY

**DURING THE SEASON, THE BIG
BRAIN LUMBER COMPANY RE-
PECTS TO CUT TWELVE MIL-
LION FEET**

With a crew sufficient to make a
daily cut of 60,000 feet, the Big Brain
Lumber company's saw mill on the
West Side commenced operations this
morning. The mill will be kept busy
until the end of the summer, as it is
the intention to cut all of the tim-
ber the company owns near Keno,
preparatory to the building of a large-
er mill on the Upper Lake and the re-
moval of the machinery to that plant.

It is believed that 12,000,000 feet
of lumber will be cut at the West Side
mill this season. The greater part of
this is taken by the Big Brain plan-
ing mill, to be shipped to Middle
Western points in a finished state.
