

PROGRESSIVES FRAMING BILLS

ANTI-CHILD LABOR AND WOMEN'S MINIMUM WAGE WILL BE THE FIRST OF THIRTY-TWO, SAY LEADERS

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 1.—At least thirty-two bills formulated by the progressive party will be introduced at the special session of congress, according to leaders of the Bull Moose organization.

The first bill to be introduced will provide for federal prohibition of child labor. The second will have as its purpose the establishment of a minimum wage bill for women.

Congressman Murdock of Kansas will introduce the progressive measure in the house, according to Pendergast.

has been tried before the circuit court of this county. It is a case in which W. H. Mason sued Fred Melhase on a contract for logging for the Long Lake Lumber company. The contract was entered into on March 14, 1910. Melhase paid Mason the sum of \$11,650, and in July, 1911, Mason began suit for a balance claimed to be due on the contract. On August 1, 1911, the jury returned a verdict in favor of Mason for \$3,643.61, and the case was later appealed to the supreme court.

The case has been fought in the courts for nearly three years, and according to the decision of the supreme court today Melhase will have to pay the judgment returned by the jury in the circuit court. Kuykendall & Ferguson were the attorneys for Mason.

ALBANIA QUILTS TURKISH RULE

DUC DE MONTPENSIER IS PROCLAIMED KING AND RECOGNITION IS ASKED OF THE RULING POWERS

PARIS, A Brindisi despatch to "Excelsior" says that the provisional government of Albania has declared the Duc de Montpensier as king. He is the ranking descendant of the Albanian royalty.

The duc and his suite arrived in Brindisi this afternoon by yacht. He was greeted by Kemal Bey, the provisional president. When he announced his intention of accepting the throne the provisional government immediately proclaimed him as ruler.

The territory which has just broken away from Turkish rule, has long formed the southwestern portion of European Turkey. It extends along the western shore of the Balkan peninsula from the River Bojana to the Gulf of Arta.
