## FRENCH DRAMA IS DISCUSSED

LITERARY SOCIETY'S MEETING  
LAST NIGHT WAS ONE OF THE MOST INTERESTING ONE HELD THUS FAR

Stewart Tuesday evening, when "The French Drama in General and Rostand in Particular" was the discussion subject. Misses Florio and Dora Crump were the leaders for the evening, and they gave highly instructive talks on the history of the French drama and its various stages of development. Rollo C. Groesbeck ably outlined the history of Rostand and his achievements and contributions to the fame of his country's art.

"Cyrano de Bergerac" was the theme of an analysis by Mrs. Stewart that was of a highly educational value as was Mr. Stewart's talk of the significance of "Chanticleer."

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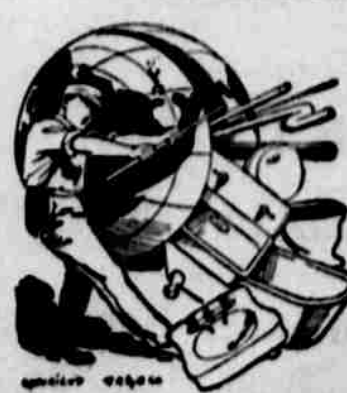
