COMMITTEE WILL SEE MARE ISLAND

QUESTION OF CHANGING NAVAL STATION FROM FIRST TO SECOND CLASS TO BE DECIDED AT ONCE

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 1.—Whether or not Mare Island navy yard shall be relegated from first to second class is to be at the urgent demand of Congressman Charles F. Curry, in whose district the yard lies. Curry reached Washington to begin his work in the national legislature just in time to hear that Daniels had approved the change. New regulations call for a 40-foot depth of channel for the first class yards, and the Napa River at the island is only twenty-seven feet deep.

Curry rushed to the navy office, pointed out that there was an appropriation which would cover dredging sufficient to restore the channel to first rank, and pleaded for delay. Daniels and his subordinates had made up their minds to keep the big ships in deep water, and were talking of locating a naval drydock on the lower bay, perhaps at Hunter's Point, San Francisco, or at Sausalito. Daniels finally yielded to Curry's plea, and ordered a special report on the cost of deepening the channel to and at Mare Island. Minors straits and the Napa River bed will both have to be cleared of silt.

If no provision is made on San Francisco Bay for the battleships, their only port for repairs while on the Pacific coast will be Bremerton.
