Scenes in Dayton During the Flood

M. B. Herman and Don Allen, two Cincinnati reporters, started for Dayton on Tuesday in an auto, and soon found roads filled with water. At one point they had to wade out into the torrent to get wood for a corduroy road.

Tow lines wound about telegraph poles were used to hold boats engaged in rescue work from the flood current, which, running twenty miles an hour, made rowing impossible.

WILL WATCH RESTAURANTS

STATE DAIRY AND FOOD COMMISSIONER SAYS EATING HOUSES ARE VIOLATING PURE FOOD LAWS

A new tangent is to be taken in the work of providing the public with pure milk and cream, according to the latest bulletin issued from the office of the state dairy and food commissioner. Instead of keeping after the dairymen alone, the commissioner intends to see that hotels and restaurants serve none but pure foodstuffs. The following extract is from the bulletin:

"Hotels and restaurant keepers are the worst offenders in the adulteration of milk and cream, some through ignorance of the law, some through carelessness of employees, and others with intent to save money.

"Any party serving milk over a counter or on a table is subject to the same law that governs the dairymen, creameryman or milk dealer. Milk is illegal if it contains less than 2.5 per cent butterfat and more than 25 per cent of water.

"Cream that contains less than 20 per cent butterfat is illegal, and we see no reason whatever why hotels and restaurants cannot comply with the law, and we shall require them to do so."
