TEN AND FIFTEEN DOLLARS
RENTAL ASKED FOR ONE DAY'S
USE OF BUILDINGS, AND SOME
CLERKS ASK TWO PAYS

That the cost of printing ballots
and charters, posting notices, etc.,
are not the only items of expense in
connection with an election, was
brought home to the council last
month.

Notable among the bills were those
for rent of polling places for one
day. In every case but one the rental
was fixed at \$10; in the other case
\$15 was asked.

"That is about as much rent as
some of the buildings would bring in
a month," remarked a councilman.

"We'd better to buy tents," was
the way another sized it up.

In the end the bills were allowed in
half the amounts asked for.

The bills for lunches for the elec-
tion boards brought out two claims
for feeding the election officials of
the Third ward, one from the Rex
cafe, the other from the Comstock
hotel. Police Judge Leavitt ordered
lunch for the board at the Rex, but
they, not knowing this, ordered lunch
sent over from the Comstock.

soup to the board at noon, and re-
turned to the restaurant for the re-
mainder of the dinner. When the
waiter again entered the polling place
with a tray of edibles, he was sur-
prised to find the judges and clerks
masticating a dinner sent from the
Comstock.

Scenes in Dayton During the Flood



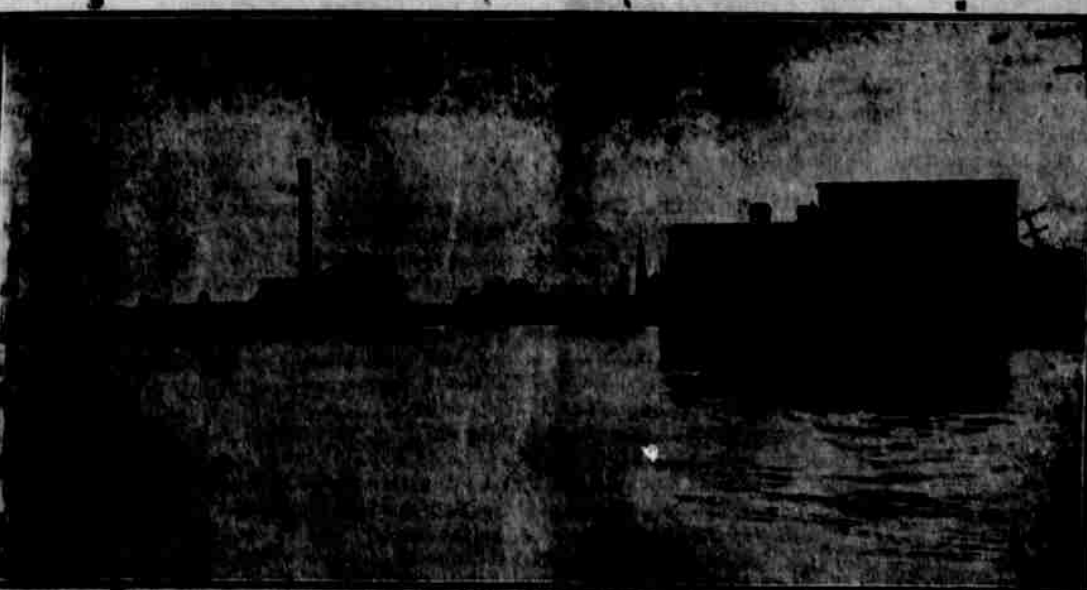

OPINIONS DIFFER REGARDING WAR

MILITARY EXPERT SCOUTS THE-
ORY OF IMMINENT DANGER.
HISTORIAN LOOKS FOR EARLY
HOSTILITIES

BERLIN, April 8.—The German
empire, by its unusual army increase
and amazing expenditures for the im-
plements of battle, is seeking peace—
not war, is the opinion of Count Ernst
Reventlow, German military and
naval expert, who today analyzed the
European situation for the United
Press. According to Reventlow, Ger-
many has no chip on her shoulder,
but by her whirlwind military prepa-
rations is trying to put the fear of
God and the German army into her
avaricious neighbors.

"The \$250,000,000 which the Ger-
mans are asked to lay on the altar of
patriotism is the heavy premium on
insurance against war," said Revent-
low, who is not at all the firebrand
his critics sometimes picture him.

"This vast sum is, among other
things, to add 100,000 men to the
military wall along the Russian fron-
tier and, if it averts war or prevents
the possibility of war, the German
people will find the price of peace
none too great. If, on the other hand,
the remote possibility of war should
become an eventuality, we would be
well prepared. The \$250,000,000 in
any event should be considered a good
investment.

"I do not think we are on the brink
of immediate war, but the times are
grave for Germany. Situated as we
are in Central Europe, we are sur-
rounded by ambitious neighbors, who,
if not held in bounds, might menace
the empire.

"It is absurd to attribute aggressive
motives to the kaiser and his govern-
ment. Wilhelm II., by his twenty-
five years of peaceful reign, a record
unmatched by any other living Euro-
pean monarch, certainly has demon-
strated that he is not a 'war lord.' It
is a fact that the agitation for increas-
ed armament came first from the Ger-
man people, and did not originate
with the kaiser. It grew out of the
Balkan war, and the possibility of
Slavonic encroachment. The insus-
taining of the great powers to prevent or
even check the Balkan struggle open-
ed the eyes of the German people.
Germany now is arming because of
the increased possibility of an en-
larged Slav monarchy on the one side
and the rekindled desire for 'revenge'
in the breasts of the French people.

"Germany has no designs on
France, and the French know it, but
they are taking advantage of the gen-
eral uncertainty to fan their desire
for 'revenge' for 1870. President
Poincare, in his first speech, men-
tioned Alsace-Lorraine, and almost im-
mediately Delcasse was sent to Rus-
sia. I think there will be no war, but
Russia is said to have 1,500,000 men
under arms, most of them within
striking distance of the German and
Austrian borders. As Bismarck said
on another occasion: 'Under such
circumstances, the guns might go off
themselves.'"

A different view of the European
situation apparently is taken by Prof.
Hans Delbruck, Germany's foremost
historian, who said that he considered
Germany in grave danger of actual
war.

"The appeal to the nation for the
unprecedented and enormous appropria-
tion is a realization of the grave
danger that Germany finds herself
confronted by today," he said. "Ger-

JUNIOR STUDENTS TREAD "BOARDS"

"RALPH ROISTER DOISTER," A
PRIMITIVE ENGLISH METRICAL
COMEDY, GIVEN AT ASSEMBLY
TODAY

Something out of the ordinary was
the attraction at today's assembly at

may be in terrible danger, the grav-
ity of which cannot be exaggerated,
of being involved in a war that we do
not desire and are seeking to avoid.

"That danger is Russia, not France
or England. Under the spur of the
pan-Slavic movement, brought on by
the success of the Slavs in the Balkan
war against Turkey, Russia is pursu-
ing a relentless policy, which, if not
curbed, cannot but lead to war. It is
playing a strong hand in the Balkans,
encouraging Bulgaria and Serbia not
to accept reasonable peace terms from
Turkey; advising Montenegro to
stand out against Austria-Hungary;
stiffening Bulgaria to oppose Rou-
mania and otherwise taking a hand
in the Balkan tangle.

"Austria's strength as a German
ally has been largely sapped by her
own troubles in the Balkans, and the
German government, therefore, is but
doing its duty in preparing for any
eventuality. Under the unusual ten-
sion and abnormal conditions, Ger-
many's warlike preparations are only
sane and logical."

"But the Russian czar is for
peace," was interposed.

"So was Czar Alexander," Del-
bruck replied, "but the same pan-
Slavic spirit which forced him into
war with Turkey in 1876 is at work
today, menacing the peace of all Eu-
rope."

"What if Bulgaria and Roumania
should mix?" he was asked.

"Then the big European war would
be on, and God only knows where it
would stop," was the answer.
