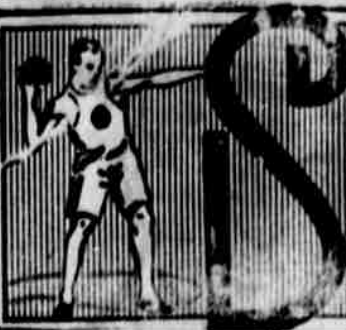

Burke Files Bond

U. S. F. & G. Co. Becomes Surety for
New Treasurer of the United
States

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 1.—
John Burke, former governor of
North Dakota, who today became the
treasurer of the United States, filed
a bond for \$150,000 with the federal
government to insure adequate care
of every cent of the nation's money
in his custody. The guarantor of his
honesty and faithfulness is a seven-
million-dollar corporation of Balti-
more, the United States Fidelity and
Guaranty company.

While the total of the treasury's
funds will run nearly a thousand
times the amount of Governor Burke's
bond, all the other treasury officials
who share with him the care of the
money are bonded, and the aggregate
security bears a much larger propor-
tion toward the total funds. Besides,
the largest loss for which a treasurer
was ever held responsible was \$600,
the contents of a sack stolen by a
laborer some years ago.

MORE NATIONAL TIMBER FOR SALE

**GOVERNMENT ANNOUNCES IN-
TENTION TO DISPOSE OF TIM-
BER TRACTS IN THE RANIER
NATIONAL FOREST**

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 10.—
The forest service has just begun to
advertise the twelfth large lot of
national forest timber offered for sale
within the past nine months. Alto-
gether it has advertised since July 1,
1912, the beginning of the present
fiscal year, about 2,500,000,000 feet,
and has closed contracts for the sale
of 1,700,000,000 feet. The latest ad-
vertised sale is of approximately 53,-
000,000 feet of saw timber in the Ra-
nier national forest, about thirty-five
miles from Tacoma.

In offering national forest timber
for sale the government first makes
an estimate of the quantity of timber
on an area which would naturally
form a single logging unit, and which
offers attractive opportunities for the
lumberman. The probable cost of
logging and manufacturing by a capa-
ble lumberman is then estimated. On
the basis of these estimates combined
with the figures for market values
and freight charges the timber is ap-
praised and then advertised for sale,
with the appraised value, from 50
cents to \$1.50 per 1,000 feet, as a
minimum price.
