BEAUTIFY HOME GROUNDS

"Who sows a field or trains a flower,
Or plants a tree is more than all;
For he who blesses most is blest,
For God and man shall own his worth,
Or who shall leave as his bequest
An added beauty to the earth."

The one thing, perhaps more than any other, that in the past has detracted from the desirability of country life and a residence in the country or country town small city, is the barrenness and unattractive surroundings of many of the homes of the residents. In many places where the possibilities of adornment and beautification are the best, the homes are wretchedly neglected—fences broken down, front yards overgrown with weeds, and back yards filled with tin cans and rubbish. Is it any wonder that children reared in such an environment become discontented, and when older are aroused with a desire to seek places that are more inviting. When grown to maturity and given the opportunity of traveling and seeing places of beauty and comparing them with the sordid and mean surroundings of the "old home," it is not strange that the young people have been leaving the farms and country towns for the large cities, where boulevards of beautiful homes and numerous well kept public parks attract the stranger and visitor.

As the home and all that it stands for is the very foundation of our modern civilization, so in the upbuilding of the country town, the homes of the residents thereof must be considered the main basis upon which the future welfare and growth of the town largely depend. If these homes are well kept and attractive, they at once invite the stranger, and the visitor is loth to leave a place so situated, and longs for a time to return.

In any community where a condition of neglect and ugliness obtains in reference to home surroundings, it may be remedied with but little expenditure of money, and with only such labor as can be well spared from industry and business, using mainly such time as is otherwise wasted. By the planting of a few trees, shrubs and vines, the making of a lawn, and the arrangement of walks and drives, every place in the country or village may be transformed into a charming and attractive home.

The people of our towns and small cities have in their power to remedy the barrenness and unloveliness of their homes, even if many of their neighbors have grown negligent and indifferent to their home surroundings. To get things started along this line, a civic improvement society may be necessary to influence all property owners to plant trees on the parkings, start lawns, grow shrubs and flowers, and secure the adoption of regulations that will keep the town clean and sanitary.

With the improvement and beautification of home surroundings will come benefits other than the mere gratification of an artistic taste. A house neatly painted and surrounded by lawns, trees and flowers will have a larger selling value than a building on a bare lot and showing marks of carelessness and neglect. With the beautification of the home and its environment will come a desire for better conditions of life generally. Increased comfort in the home will be sought, and the family, including the boys as well as the girls, will find life more enjoyable, and the lure of the big city will have lost its power over the young people when they arrive at the age when they must start out in the world to do for themselves. The beautification of the country home, therefore, enters into the problem of congestion of population in our large cities and points to one of the solutions thereof.

FARMERS UNITE WITH SUCCESS

WILLAMETTE VALLEY COMMUNITY'S ORGANIZATION HAS BETTERED CONDITIONS FOR ALL THE MEMBERS

The following is taken from an article entitled "Businesslike Community Farming," published in the current issue of Farm and Fireside:

"One of the best demonstrations of the businesslike attitude of the Oregon mind is the East Gaston Association of Washington county, in the Willamette Valley, about twenty-five miles south of Portland. The association embraces a rich farm area of about seventy-five square miles. The genius of the scheme is Mr. W. K. Newell, president of the association, which includes about fifty farmers.

"They voted to raise the same kind of stock. They at once proceeded, about three years ago, to raise only Holstein cattle, to buy, in common, high standard bulls. Some got registered heifers, and all cows had the Holstein strain, no other bulls being used.

"On the same principle they selected two breeds of hogs—Berkshires and Jersey Reds—and worked out all the others that did not have one or the other of these strains.

"They also settled upon one breed of sheep, and for poultry they raised only White Leghorns and Rhode Island Reds.

"No one in the association advertises or pushes the sale of anything as from his special farm, but everything is 'East Gaston.' They get four cents a pound more for the butterfat in East Gaston cream than any other brings. They guarantee the quality and also the amount they will furnish. No one of them pays more than 5 per cent interest on money, and that in a part of the world where 8 per cent is quite the common figure. The members of the association know all about one another's business, and if necessary will back up anyone who needs money for the improvement or development of farm or stock.

"They have clubbed together and purchased the best threshing machine on the market, and confine its use to their own members. The same is true of their other farm machinery.

"If any one of them discovers a bulletin, or book, or article that all should read, he passes the word around.

"So exceedingly profitable is this to all members of the association that it is to be given state recognition, and other communities are to be organized for the same purpose along lines of interests in different localities."

SAN FRANCISCO, April 11—Arch- ed trusses for the Palace of Machinery, the largest building of its kind ever constructed on the Pacific coast, are now being put in place on the Panama-Pacific international exposition.

There are 125 of the trusses, each weighing four tons. Two giant "travelers" are used in placing the heavy woodwork in place.

The trusses rise 100 feet from the floor of the immense structure. It is estimated that 7,000,000 feet of lumber will be used in their construction.

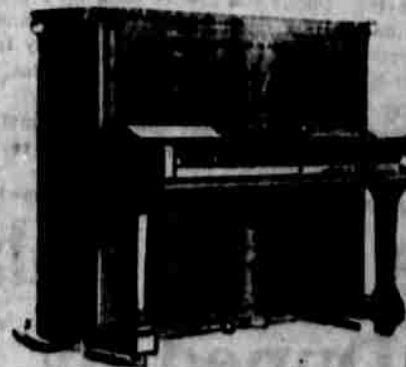

OREGON WELL REPRESENTED IN THE PERMANENT ST. PAUL AGRICULTURAL DISPLAY FROM "ZONE OF PLENTY."

Oregon will no doubt derive great and lasting benefits from the permanent display of grains and grasses in the exhibition room of the Northwest Development League in St. Paul. Splendid samples of wheat, oats, flax, rye and barley were part of the state's magnificent agricultural exhibit at the recent Minneapolis and Chicago land shows and were brought East for display purposes by the Great Northern Railway. Commercial organizations, the railroads and the Development League are carrying on an extensive publicity campaign to attract the attention of visitors in the Twin City to the display of the products of the soil of the American Northwest and it is likely thousands of people will view the exhibit annually.

One of the features of the Oregon exhibit is a sample of fall rye seven feet high. Varieties of oats include Mammoth Cluster, Storm King and Silver Mine. White Bonanza is also shown in the display. Grass Flax, Big Club, Blue Stem and Red Club varieties of wheat are well featured in the Oregon grain exhibit. Excellent flax samples and six row barley form a part of the display. Shelled grains in glass jars complete the grain exhibit. Grass samples include timothy, red clover, alfalfa, bunch grass, blue joint and bromes.

In the Oregon exhibit are a large number of jars containing fine samples of processed fruits of different varieties. The forests have provided an exhibit of woods of several kinds. The exhibition room is well supplied with Oregon literature descriptive of the state in general and by communities. The exhibit is open morning, afternoon and evening and representatives of the League give information about the states of Oregon, Minnesota, Montana, Washington, Idaho and the Dakotas, the seven states which the Development League is seeking to advance.
