FISTICUFF GAME FOR MONTANANS

TWELVE-ROUND BOUTS CAN BE STAGED AFTER TOMORROW, UNDER THE SUPERVISION OF A BOXING COMMISSION

HELENA, Mont., April 12.—After tomorrow boxing will be legalized in Montana. The bill permitting the sport under state supervision, which the recent legislature passed and the governor signed, will be in effect then, and it is expected to result in a revival of the fight game in the state. Under the law, bouts up to twelve rounds will be permitted, but only under the direction of the boxing commission. Ten per cent of the gross receipts must be turned into the state treasury. Several boxing associations have already been organized.

OREGON DEBATERS WIN FROM UTAH

VERNON MOTCHENBACHER, A MEMBER OF THE TEAM, IS LOCAL BOY—UNIVERSITY LEADS DEBATERS OF SIX STATES

EUGENE, April 12.—The University of Oregon debating team, composed of Vernon Motchenbacher of Klamath Falls, and Howard Zimmerman of Salem, won the debate with the University of Utah at Salt Lake City, maintaining the affirmative side of the question of the exclusion from the United States of the Slavonic and Hellenic races of Southern Europe.
In doing so the Oregon team won for the university the debate championship of six states, for Oregon has won from Washington and California, while Utah has won from Montana and Idaho.

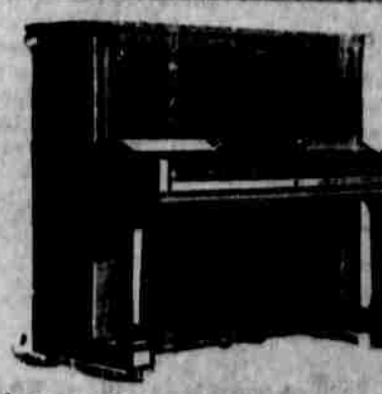
