CIVIC DEVELOPMENT

THERE is today a general movement over the country for civic betterment and the improvement of our cities and towns. Many earnest men and women throughout the land are devoting their best thought and time to the solution of the problems confronting American cities, and it is due, no doubt, largely to their efforts that there has been a great civic awakening in many of our cities. Patriotic men and women, who love their home town, are striving for the betterment of civic conditions, and in many places the progress made in a brief time is marvelous. Cities that formerly reeked with municipal scandal, graft and corruption have been purified. Sanitary conditions have been greatly improved. The water supply has been purified. Comprehensive plans for parks, children's play grounds and the beautification of the town have been adopted and carried out. The billboard and other nuisances have been abated. The milk supply has been improved, and the matter of clean and pure foods has been looked after. Manual training and teaching of civic pride have been aroused. The people have been inspired to promote higher ideals of civic life, and the future promises much for the general advancement of American cities.

But notwithstanding the steady growth of this movement, the work of civic betterment may be said to have only begun. When one travels about and takes observations he will see the need of still greater improvements, more comprehensive and wise planning, and more vigorous and well directed work. With the general movement there should be more local organization, for each town must work out the details according to local needs and conditions.

It is always uphill work to start anything in the line of reform, and civic improvement is no exception to the rule. Everybody may see the need of cleaning up and beautifying the town, but when it comes to doing the actual work there are few who really care enough about it to do even their own share. In nearly every town one will notice here and there well kept lawns, neat and clean back yards; but perhaps on the next street, or in the same block, one finds ragged lawns, old board fences, filthy back yards and alleys, vacant lots overgrown with weeds, unsightly billboards and other things that combine to make the town "ragged," unsightly and unsanitary. When a town is in this condition some method must be devised to arouse interest in civic improvement. There is needed some leading spirit who takes enough interest in his town to organize a local improvement society, whose members both by precept and example will start the work going.

One of the most potent factors in the present movement for civic betterment and town improvement is the influence of women. Through their clubs and organizations the women have accomplished much in towns all over the country. Many instances could be cited where wonderful things have been done in a very short space of time through organized effort, intelligently and wisely directed. In many places through the instrumentality of children practical methods of civic betterment have been worked out. The results have been the real beginning of civic development.
